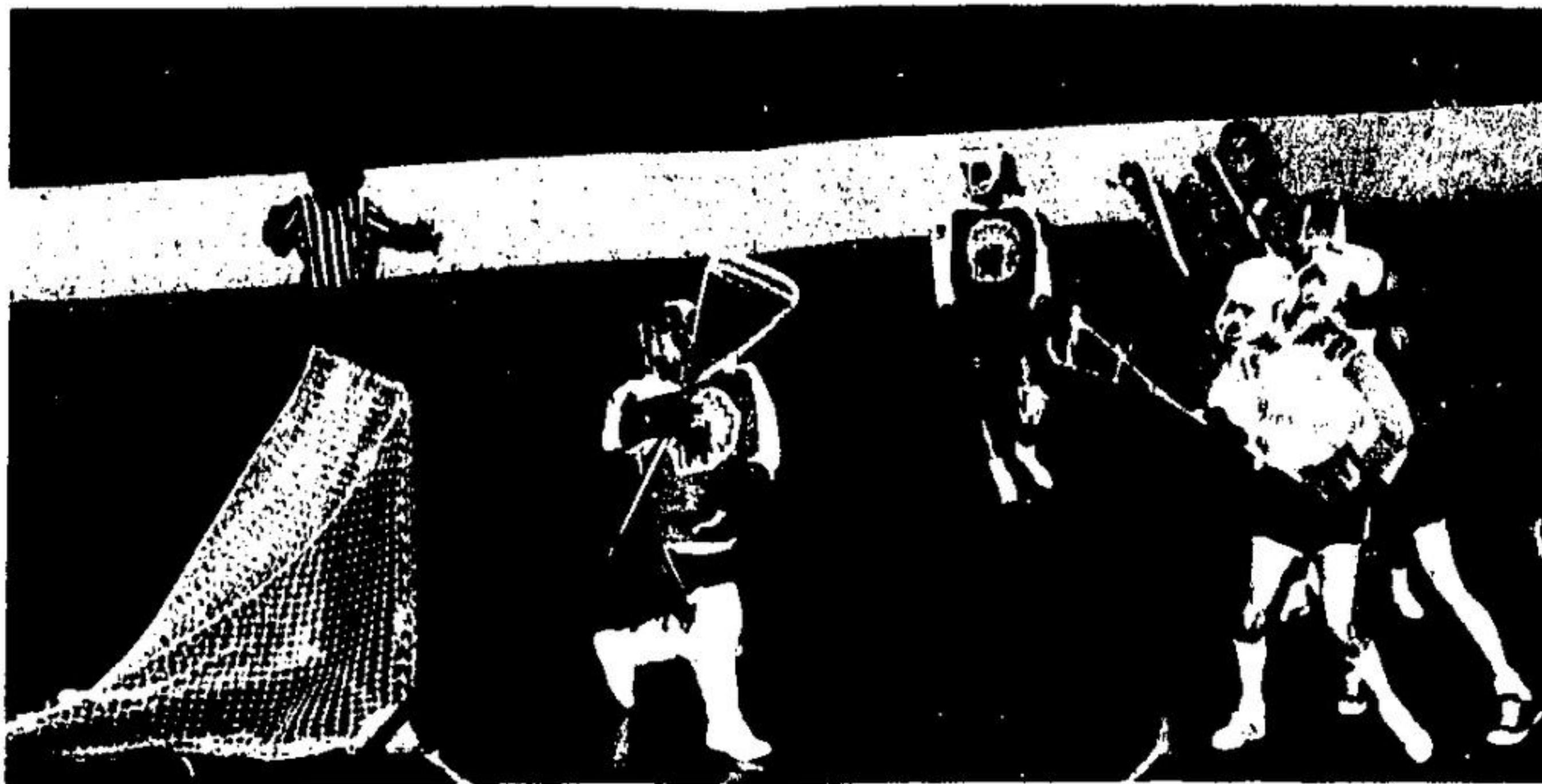

Bow in overtime, Rams have backs against wall

Acton Rams have their backs against the wall as they prepare for the third game of their tier 2 Junior "C" semi-finals series with East York Mohawks at the community centre tonight (Wednesday).

Mohawks, who managed only two wins in six regular season games with Acton have suddenly

taken command of the post-season series. A 14-11 overtime win here Monday night gave East York a 2-0 lead in games in the best of seven set.

Fourth game is scheduled for Leaside arena tomorrow (Thursday) night with the fifth if necessary back in Acton Monday August 6.

HRCA favors 401

In a submission to the Soland Commission investigating routing of the proposed 500 KV hydro line, the Halton Region Conservation Authority will recommend the line follow Highway 401 through the county.

A staff report outlined three possible alternatives for the route and analyzed them by land requirements and effect on homes, farms, scrubland, and woodlots. The path given first priority had the least effect on authority holdings.

It cut, however, right through

Nassagaweya Reeve Anne MacArthur's farm and some neighboring properties. Mrs. MacArthur declared a conflict of interest and did not vote on the route. She expressed concern that the most beautiful stretch along Highway 401 would be destroyed by the power line.
