The Grand River Conservation Authority has received provincial approval to expropriate about 2.150 neres of land needed for the Guelph dam and reservoir, east of Guelph and North of 24 High-

### Spotted Grapevine Beetle

Some local residents have become quite concerned over a rather large beetle they are finding around their grape vines. This probably is a Spotted Grapevine Beetle and is quite common at this time of year.

The adult is over an inch long. very broad, tan and glossy with four black spots on each side of its body. This beetle feeds on grapo leaves and a larval stage feeds on decaying wood and old

.If the population of this insect is low there is no need to alarm as little injury will result. Control would be senseless at this stage. However, if you feel resulting damage is significant the recommended control is Sevin. This can be obtained at your local hardware store in one pound bags. Always follow the directions on the label carefully.






