#### Erin township council briefs

At the regular meeting, August 1, Erin Township Council: Was informed that all necessary papers concerning the third phase of Hillsburgh subdivision were signed.

Discussed the request of Mr. Silverstein of Toronto, to build a house on his recently acquired property. D. Lawrence, the manager of the standardbred farm is in the existing house. Council decided not to grant permission if Mr. Silverstein is planning on living in Erin but working in Toronto.

-Passed a motion increasing the maximum Workmen's Compensation for firemen from \$9,000 to \$10,000.

Passed a motion approving the request of Anthony Zdrill to put Hydro into his trailer, at the foot of the Eighth Line Hill. -Received a \$25,100 subsidy cheque from the department of

Transport and Communication. -Received a letter from the Ministry of the Environment informing council that open burning at the sanitary landfill site must be stopped by June, 1974.

-Learned from Carmen Parkinson that logs from dead elms taken into the dump were filling it up. Reeve Lloyd Lang advised only domestic waste should be accepted. The logs could be turned away.

-Read a letter from Alan Rimmer, concerning the notice claiming he owed over \$700 business tax. Mr. Rimmer stated he had never had a business, that the now-defunct Everdale College was not a business, and that he was only founder and a member of the board of directors. Mr. Rimmer protested that the tax was levied against him personally and not against the college. Reeve Long stated the matter did not involve council, and Mr. Rimmer must contact the assessment board to appeal, if he wants to. -Instructed building inspector Jim Delaney to check on trailers in

the township without permits.

-Presented road superintendent Ed Bardon with a certificate on completion of a course on road improvement.

-Read a letter from Judy Leeder who is planning a 2,267 marathon ride across Canada by horse, in April 1974. The ride will be in aid of crippled children, research and expenses, and Miss Leeder asked for support in the venture. Reeve Lang instructed that the letter be filed for a month, after clerk Elmer McKinnon pointed out that council couldn't legally give to her directly.

Decided to take legal action against people not paying their dog tax, in the township. A registered letter will be sent first.

### Jeering ratepayers complain about chronic Hillsburgh water shortage

Thirty-aix angry Hillsburgh subdivision residents crowded Erin Township municipal building, August 1, to bring their problems of a water shortage before council. Their concern was that the third phase of the aubdivision, due to start soon,

would compound the problem. Reeve Lloyd Lang outlined the present water supply system. figured to be sufficient for all three phases of the aubdivision, adding, "Although the tank holds 18,000 gallons, it seems the pump (which handles 75 gallons per minute) is not up to putting water into it and keeping it there." After Michael Brodigan,

engineer of the third phase, said the hydrology expert must know the exact problems in order to solve them, residents said that water was limited for lawns, and pressure was not there when

Others added that while only 43 houses were built, there were no problems other than mechanical failures. When the next 47 houses were built and occupied, more water was being used than was pumped in. There was complete stoppage at times, and the backdrawing created a health hazard. The shortage was from May to October, every day. Dave Turnbull of the Inter-

national Water Company, joined the discussion saying he had monitored the system in the again. spring and found it should be adequate. However, due to a

malfunction, water was going back down the line and being recirculated. He added the problem might be partly solved by stopping the recirculation and jacking up the capacity of the

well pump. An irate resident pointed out that there was a fringe problem with 43 homes, a real problem with 100, and asked if the steps to be taken would quadrupte the

water production for 185 homes. Reeve Lang Informed the delegation that now equipment was ordered and would be in operation before the third phase houses were occupied. Mr. Turnbull added that he would monitor the peaks, and the equipment's ability to handle the

DOURKS. Residents said that the town's restriction for watering lawns only meant that everyone rushed out to water at the same time, creating another peak. Several people added their own


