Lions abandon moving plans sell CN station

Acton's old CN station is being dismantled and the lumber in it salvaged, Acton Lions Club revealed this week. The club bought the building from CN, but sold it to an Acton man for salvage.

In a letter to Parks Board the club said although permission had been granted to put the building in the park, building ex-perts found it would be uneconomical to move it down Knox Ave. The building was constructed in three phases and would have required complete dismantling and reassembly. "We have consequently sold it to be dismantled and the lumber salvaged," the letter said.

." When we first looked into this project, we had considered a site on the Lakeview side of the lake, and had been assured by movers it could be moved up the route to that side. However, a site mutually acceptable to all parties affected could not be found on that side.

"We feel the cost involved in dismantling and rebuilding is not warranted as a lot of renovating, wiring, plumbing, heating, etc. would also be required. It is our intention to use our financial resources for some other centennial project," the letter declared.

The letter concluded with thanks for the co-operation of the board and stated that while the project is dropped, the Lions have

gained a greater insight into the workings and problems of the board.

The Lions sold the station to Henry J. McCarthy, of R.R. 1, Acton, who has been tearing it down for the last three weeks. He says the CN has given him until September 12 to have it completely dismantled and moved but thinks the railway would be lenient if he could not meet the date.

"They built this to last a 1,000 years," he told the Free Press last week. "It is well put together."

Mr. McCarthy said most of the wood in the station is oak and pine. Insulation in the walls is thick. Workmen assisting him to tear it down were impressed with the quality of the workmanship.

Although the CN had moved most of the furniture and other valuable equipment. much of the fine wood remained when Mr. McCarthy and his helpers started the dismantling job.

McCarthy wondered why it was coming down when it would have made a much better passenger depot than the little modern glassed klosk which the railway has erected in its stead. He said he understood a bigger building was to be constructed, but still felt it would be pale in comparison with the older building.
