## Acton parks homes away from home

"It's our home away from home", said a Clarkson woman about her family's lakefront trailer site in Smallwood Acres Park on the first Line, Esquesing. They are among the 150 families at Smallwood acres and about 60 in the Breezes who regard a patch of ground near Fairy Lake as a summer hideaway.

May, rent a chunk of land in either of the two parks, leave their trailer and build a semi-permanent home around it. The Smallwoods and Mr. and Mrs. Wood of the Breezes rent lots by the summer season to patrons who visit the community of wheels whenever they can afford the time.

Smallwood acres bears a strong resemblance to a miniature subdivision though its well ordered, cedar-lined avenues serve often for baseball diamonds and soccer fields as well as arteries for vehicular traffic.

Urban development in the Breezes has occurred more spontaneously and haphazardly with trailers and tents lining the lake in unfashioned rows.

Summer residents are given complete use of all the facilities available from the parks—swimming, boating, fishing and

others. Campers regard their trailers on the lake as cottages without the drive.

Most park residents are from Oakville, Mississauga and Toronto and commute to Acton on weekends and during summer vacations to escape city heat. Some, however, are farther from home, representing all parts of Canada and the United States. Both parks report business has improved since last year.
