

Want subdivision approvals before regional government

Armed with sketches of a fourth phase of their Kingham Hill Estates building program slated for the former Campbell farm, Mike Brodigan and Roger Cunningham of Cobble Hill Development Ltd. made an informal presentation to Acton council last week. But enthusiasm from council was lacking.

"We are not in a position to rule on any new subdivisions," the mayor said shaking his head. "We have enough on our hands now."

Cunningham explained that the

company was battling to get all the approvals they could before regional government was introduced into North Halton, which includes Acton. "We have to consider what to do with the land, because once October 1 comes we'll have a terrible time having anything approved," he predicted.

He said it would take 12 months before regional government was set up properly and it would be next to impossible to have anything approved during that period.

Phase two of the condominium town house development in the subdivision was proceeding well and the company has already sold 26 of the 63-home development before the roofs were on a few of them, he told council.

The two engineers were also involved in discussion with council over the installation of services on phase three of their project along the rear of Fairview cemetery. The company has levelled the ground and is installing pipe.

Residents oppose road work county will inspect site

A 55-signature petition from Norval residents, protesting the widening of Adamson St. North, was presented to the Halton County Roads Committee last week.

The road construction would eliminate curves on the road into the village and also a number of

maple trees. The Norval deputation, led by Bill Pomeroy, was also disturbed about the amount of traffic the new construction would bring. Five hundred cars pass through Norval each day now, he said, and the figure projected for 1990 was 5,000.

The deputation asked the county to reconsider the decision to widen the street, made a year ago when they were presented with two alternate routes by an engineering firm. The second route went through an unopened road allowance south of the village. Mr. Pomeroy said the engineering firm told him the county would eventually have to use the unopened road anyway, even if they did widen Adamson St. first.

Lower cost
The new route was estimated at a cost of \$790,000 in 1971, while the Adamson St. construction now being surveyed will cost \$600,000.

The problem is further complicated because repairs are required on a bridge over the Credit River on the existing route. School buses unload before driving over then pick up their passengers again on the other side. Repair costs were included in the Adamson St. figure.

Several committee members were sympathetic to the Norval residents' position and decided to meet at Norval to inspect the two routes before making a decision.

Vote of thanks for paraplegic

A young paraplegic who wanted to do something to help someone will receive commendation from Halton County Health Unit. Donna Lemmond of Oakville is a paraplegic and a university student in social work who spent all summer working at the Burlington office of the Halton County Health Unit.

The health unit obliged. From there on she never missed a day. Because she is restricted to a wheel chair, Miss Lemmond's opportunities for summer jobs were restricted.

After Miss Craig described the girl as a very reliable, conscientious worker who wanted to help without pay and as one who never missed a day, the board voted to send her a letter of thanks and \$150.

Questioned why the girl wasn't hired on a part time basis for the summer, Miss Craig explained no part time help had been hired and if she hadn't come along the unit would have had to get along without her.

Thomas Wilfred Kennedy died unexpectedly at his home, R.R. 2, Rockwood, on August 8. He was 76 years of age.

Mr. Kennedy worked at road construction for 12 years and then farmed. He was a school trustee for a number of years, was on the board of the Federation of Agriculture and a director of the co-operative when hospitalization and medical coverage were begun. He was an elder of Nassagaweya Presbyterian church for 25 years and

secretary-treasurer for 31 years. He was a willing worker in all activities of his church. He was overseas for two years in the first war and his interests included carpentry, gardening and sports.

Survivors
Mr. Kennedy leaves his wife Dora L. (Fatt) Kennedy, son Thomas Edward Kennedy, R.R. 2, Rockwood and daughter Hazel D. Everdell, Port Hope, seven grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, sister Olive B. Massey, Milton and brother John J. Kennedy, Milton.

He was predeceased by a daughter Ruth, sister Alice and brother Lyle as well as his parents.

He was born in Nassagaweya May 20, 1897, son of Thomas J. and Sarah Kennedy, and lived all his life in the township. His marriage was at Erindale in 1926.

The funeral service was August 10 at the Rumley-Shoemaker funeral home, Acton, conducted by the Rev. John Murray and John Deyarmond.
