Competing against 23 skaters from all parts of Canada and the United States, 12 year old Kevin Parker, R.R. 1 Campbellville, won the pre-novice men's title at the Central Ontario invitational free skating championships in Toronto recently. Last year Kevin won the pre-juvenile and juvenile events at the same competition.

A member of the Acton Figure Skating Club who now takes instruction from professional Neil Carpenter in London, Kevin was awarded first place by all judges of the event with a total of 24.9 points out of a possible 25. Keith Swindiehurst of the Upper Canada Figure Skating Club was second and Paul Martini of Woodbridge third in the event.

More than 600 skaters took part in the annual summer skating

championships which have now become the largest of their kind in the world. The event is designed to give upcoming seniors, juniors and skaters in lower levels the feel of international competition.

Kevin's win was even more impressive considering he competed while suffering from strep throat. He went straight to bed when he returned home Monday.

Now training for the Western Ontario sectional championships which take place in December, Kevin is also beginning pairs skating with Patricia Black of London. Although he has been figure skating only 3½ years, he is now working on his fourth figure.

Kevin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Parker. He is a Grade 7 student at Brookville school.
