



\$12,000 damage to milk truck

Eighteen year old Warren Lowe of Stouffville escaped injury last Wednesday morning when the tractor-trailer he was driving went off the road and rolled over on 20 Sideroad, at the Sixth Line intersection near Limehouse.

Hauling milk, the tractor-trailer was southbound on the Sixth Line, when Lowe attempted to make a left-hand turn onto 20 Sideroad, and lost control, causing the vehicle to leave the road and roll over.

Police estimated damage to the tractor-trailer at \$12,000.

Esquesing, North Halton Acton's choice of names

Esquesing is first choice and North Halton second choice for a new name for the town of North Halton, according to Acton council. They had received 34 replies to an ad in the Free Press, 21 of them favoring the name Esquesing and four North Halton. The other ballots indicated a variety of other names.

Council at a special meeting Tuesday passed a resolution

recommending the two names. The choices, along with two names each picked by Esquesing township and Georgetown, go to a meeting of a steering committee Thursday (tomorrow). This committee will pick the two names which will appear on the ballot in the October election.

The mayor and clerk were named the town's representatives on this steering committee. Traffic study.

An agreement will be signed by the town with M.M. Dillon Ltd. for a traffic and parking operation study. The study is expected to begin about Sept. 6.

Motions were passed to officially authorize the repaving of Hower Ave. and the plan of subdivision for eight lots on Churchill Rd. N., provided the approval of the engineer and planner is obtained.

The special meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m. Only councillor Norm Elliott was absent. Next regular council meeting is Sept. 11.

Brigade on hand for minor blazes

Acton Fire Brigade was summoned to two minor fires in close order Saturday morning.

The first blast alerted the Acton volunteers to a small roof fire at the home of Fred Allen, Agnes St. Mr. Allen had been scorching paint when the roof started in flames.

Firefighters checked the building's eaves to ensure the fire was completely extinguished.

Another Saturday morning alarm signalled a small fire at phase two of the Kingham Hill Estates construction site. A scorched door frame and aluminum window rang up damage totalling about \$100.

It is expected flames were started by a cigarette tossed by one of the workmen at the site.

On the weekend Canada's largest gun show in Acton

The largest gun show ever held in Canada is being hosted this Saturday and Sunday in the Acton community centre by the Halton Antique Arm Collectors' Association.

Members of gun and revolver clubs, antique arms collectors' associations and hunting clubs from Ontario, Quebec and the bordering states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan will set up displays on 500 tables. For the first time tables will have to be set up in the auditorium as well as in the arena proper.

Special attractions will be a 72 foot display of cartridges owned by a Baden man, an antique pistol collection and a display of modern target pistols belonging to the Georgetown Revolver Club. An information service with tips on how to get involved in target pistol shooting and how to

go about getting a pistol permit will be part of the Georgetown display. Swords, uniforms, coins, medals and books will also be on display.

Armed guards

Armed security guards will be on duty to protect the displays from 5 p.m. Saturday afternoon when the first half of the show is completed until doors open again at 8 a.m. Sunday morning. Doors will open at 8 both Saturday and Sunday mornings and are expected to remain open until 5 each day. Exhibitors who have travelled long distances will be staying overnight in motels in the area.

Members of all gun clubs, collectors' associations and hunting clubs have been invited to attend free of charge. Membership cards from any of these will be honored at the door.

"We're going to try to hold a

meeting Saturday morning in hopes of forming an association of all clubs so that we may better inform the public what we are doing," H.A.A.C.A. president Hank Hupper says. "There is a lot of adverse publicity nowadays regarding gun controls and restrictions."

Invitations have been sent to several M.P.'s and members of the provincial legislature, Halton M.P. Terry O'Connor and Halton East M.P.P. Hon. Jim Snow have already replied to say they will attend. It is hoped a representative of the Attorney General's department will also attend.

As usual, trading and selling of items on display will be allowed and persons may make purchases provided they can obtain the necessary permits.

From a miniature 40 lable show in the Acton Music Centre three years ago, H.A.A.C.A. shows have grown in popularity to the point where they are considered number one in Canada. The Association has sponsored 15 shows in town during the past three years.

General admission is \$1. Ladies and children will be admitted free and as a special bonus there will be free flowers for all the ladies.

Route of line soon settled

A solution to the tangled mass of data the 500 KV hydro transmission lines between Middleport and Pickering may soon be available.

Environmental consultant Bruce Howlett will file his report and recommendations for the route of the power corridor with the Solandt Commission at a public hearing on Thursday, September 13 at Queen's Park. He will also present an oral summary of the report which his firm has been working on since October, 1972.

Mr. Howlett was retained by Mr. Solandt to undertake the public study and to make recommendations on the best location for the 500 KV line, which Hydro earlier had scheduled to run through this area.

There will also be a series of public hearings on October 15, 17, 19, 22 and 24 in order that interested parties may have an opportunity to ask questions of Mr. Howlett, and to present evidence. Interested parties who wish to make oral representations at the public hearings, either personally or through a representative, should indicate their intent in writing to the Secretary of the Solandt Commission before October 5.

Copies of Mr. Howlett's report and recommendations will be on view in area municipal offices and the Solandt Commission office at Queen's Park, Toronto.

Georgetown woman suffers cuts and bruises

The Kussab car had passed other traffic and struck the Panchenko car just as it was making a left-hand turn into a private driveway. Both cars were west-bound on the highway at the time of the collision.

Approximately \$450 damage resulted to the rear end of the Panchenko car. Police estimated damage to the front end of the Kussab car at \$500. The collision occurred about 6:15 p.m.
