Bay, Manitoulin Island have been visiting members of their family here.

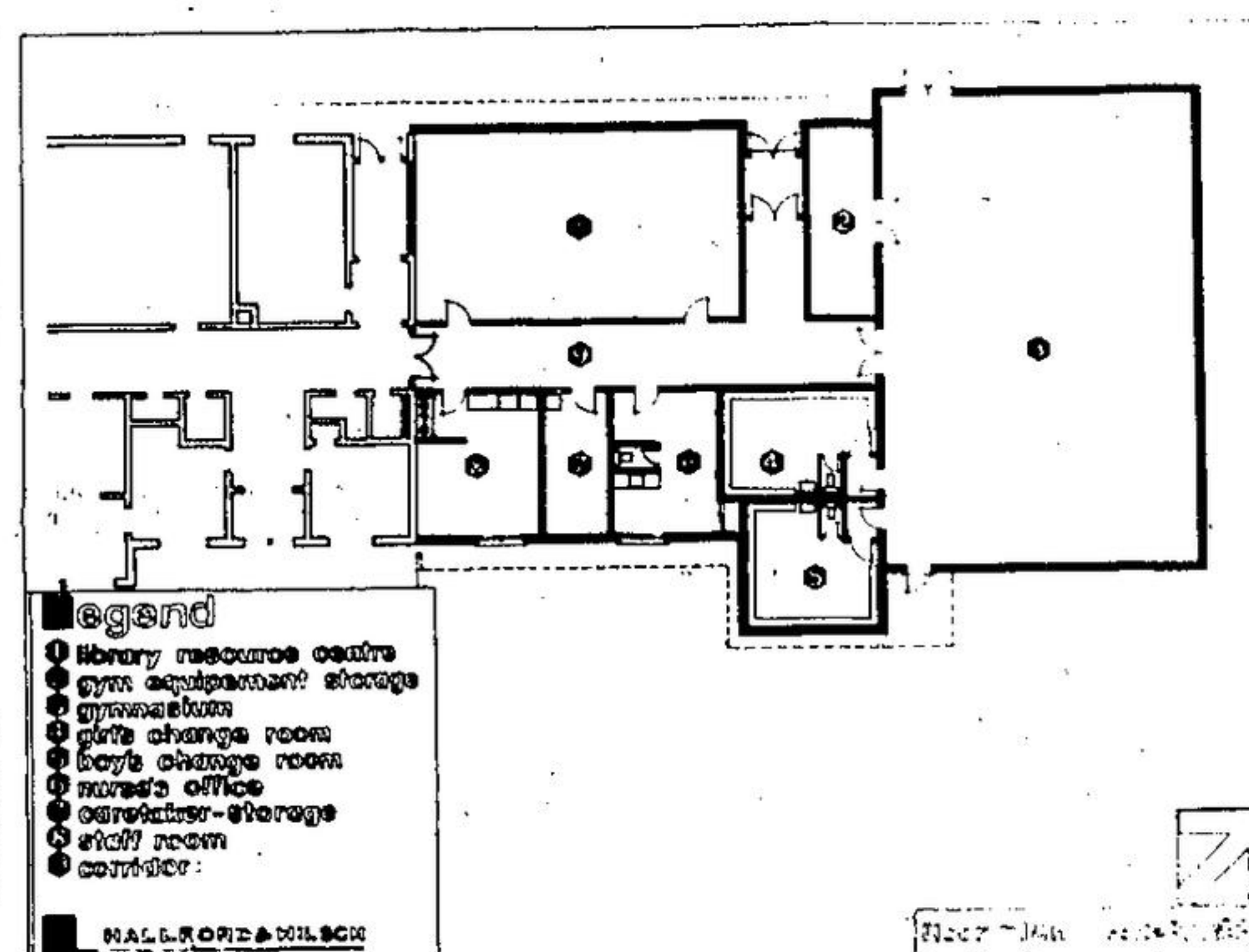
Back from Holland
