The study points out the variety of ways to attack the problem of solid waste management and the various land fill sites that might be used if land fill sites are

Both Milton and Georgetown are in a position of needing a new land fill site or some other method of disposal, almost immediately.

Milton Council has been working on a plan that might eventually see lands owned by Milton Brick used as a land fill site for this area. No Zoning

Earlier attempts to use that site were stifled because the land is in Esquesing Township and the township council would not consider zoning the land for that

As of Jan. I, 1974 when regional government comes into effect, the responsibility of solid waste disposal will become a regional responsibility.






