

Pay councillors \$4,000 - \$5,000

Halton Region Chairman Allan Masson told members of Nassagaweya Council he expected members of the new regional council would be paid \$4,000 or \$5,000 a year for the first three year term. It will be up to council to determine the salaries they receive.

Meeting with Nassagaweya Council last week during the

council's regular meeting Masson said he guessed municipal politicians would earn from \$8,000 to \$10,000 each year if they served on both local and regional councils.

He indicated some people were talking in the range of \$12,000 or \$18,000 per year for the two jobs. He said he felt that was too much. The chairman's job pays \$27,000 plus expenses.

On Tuesday evening at 11:30 p.m. the South Ontario group boarded the bus and drove all night arriving at the Grand Canyon Wednesday morning. We toured the canyon and spent the night at the Time Motel in Flagstaff, Arizona.

Tuesday morning until Friday afternoon we drove through Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and spent Friday night at the Holiday Inn, Rolla, Missouri. That evening we presented our bus drivers and chaperones Harry and Anne Bergshoeff, Ajax, with gifts of appreciation.

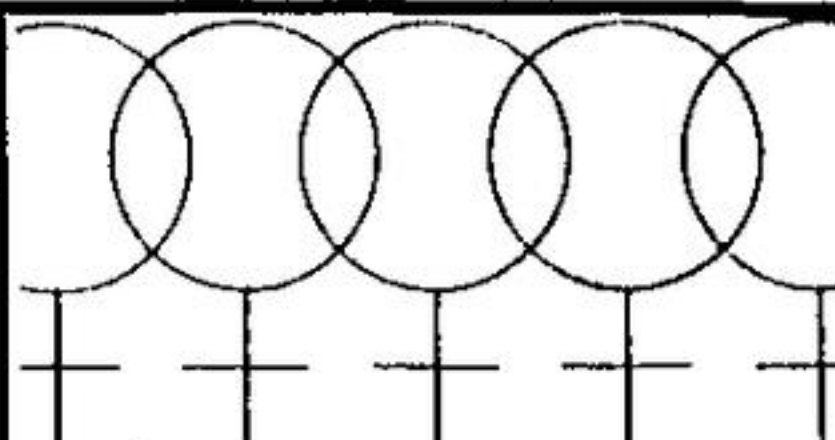
way until they reached the crossing guard at the school lane.
