Fear bill

Some firearm owners are concerned about a private member's bill now before the House of Commons which would ban all handguns and automatic guns from the hands of collectors and make it mandatory for all rifles and shotguns to be registered.

Ruppert explains that collectors are in favor of legislation that will control the criminal element of firearm owners, but not honest collectors. "Perhaps they should make it

law that anyone using a handgun during a holdup automatically gets 10 years with no chance for parole," he suggests.
