Scheme B would have involved the reconstruction of the boundary road essentially in its present location. The Credit River Bridge would have been replaced and the road to the north ould be realigned and graded down to comply with standards. The scheme was estimated to cost \$600,000 in 1970.

Scheme A is basically what the council accepted last week Scheme A would see a road built along the unopened road allowance between the two townships and crossing the Credit River south of Highway 7. An overpass would be built and some grading would have to be done. Interconnection with Highway 7 would be by means of a two lane ramp in the south east quadrant. Total cost of that project would be \$795,000

A petition with 70 names on it caused the roads committee to reconsider their earlier stand on the matter. Acton Deputy Reeve Peter Marks opposed the switch because he felt there was still some confusion about the matter. He suggested the bridge on Adamson street should be made which the escarpment passes, plus eight provincial appointees and a chairman. The chairman is expected to be a full time worker.

Official plan

Halton East MPP and Minister of Government Services Jim Snow said the job of the commission would be to develop an official plan for the escarpment. Once the plan was developed and approved it would be worked in as part of the official plans for the eight regions and counties in-

Snow said it was important that there was single balance on the committee with people from different interest groups. He said it wouldn't be good to have all quarry operators, all ecologists or naturalists or all politicians on the commission.

Three year term The commission is expected to sit for three years. All of the positions on the committee with the exception of the chairman's will be part time positions, while the chairman will be expected to

devote full time to the job. The commission being established is a result of a recommendation in the government's study on development planning for the escarpment.
