Talented dances Heather Reed was M.C. for the show which featured some talented dancing, both modern and traditional, six skits and a play entitled Rumpelstiltskin. The audience showed their appreciation with encouraging bursts of applause.

## Crossing guard child's friend

A total of 48 general occurrences were reported to members of the Acton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, during the reporting week of August 23 to August 30.

Investigations included a number of complaints of barking dogs, noisy parties, erratic drivers and minor disturbances. There were two reported missing persons; both were located and returned home by Acton detachment officers.

Major investigations included a report of mischief, one report of theft and one complaint of fraud. Seven persons were charged under the Liquor Control Act for having liquor in a place other than residence.

There were no reportable motor vehicle collisions and one motorist was arrested for impaired driving.

#### Guard is friend

If your child is attending school for the first time, make sure he or she is familiar with the way to and from school as well as pedestrian safety rules. It is a good idea to escort your child during the first week or two of attendance. If you yourself can

not accompany the child, request an older child living in your neighborhood to keep a watchful eye on your child.

Introduce your children to the crossing guard near the school they are attending. Explain to them that the crossing guard is their friend and is there to help them cross the road.

Starting school is more often than not, a frightening adventure for children. Parents

should make an effort to help their children adjust to school so that they will enjoy a safe and happy school term.

#### Bike license

An officer will be attending the schools during the coming week to check on bicycle licenses. Acton municipal by-law number 73-11, requires anyone living within the town of Acton, owning a bicycle to obtain a license. Bicycle licenses are sold at the

police office Monday to Friday, 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

When entering a parking lot, please follow directions to avoid confusion and a chance of being involved in an accident.

Enter by following signs or arrows where indicated, exit via the exit area only or side streets where possible. Assist the police in making your trip to the local stores a safe one.

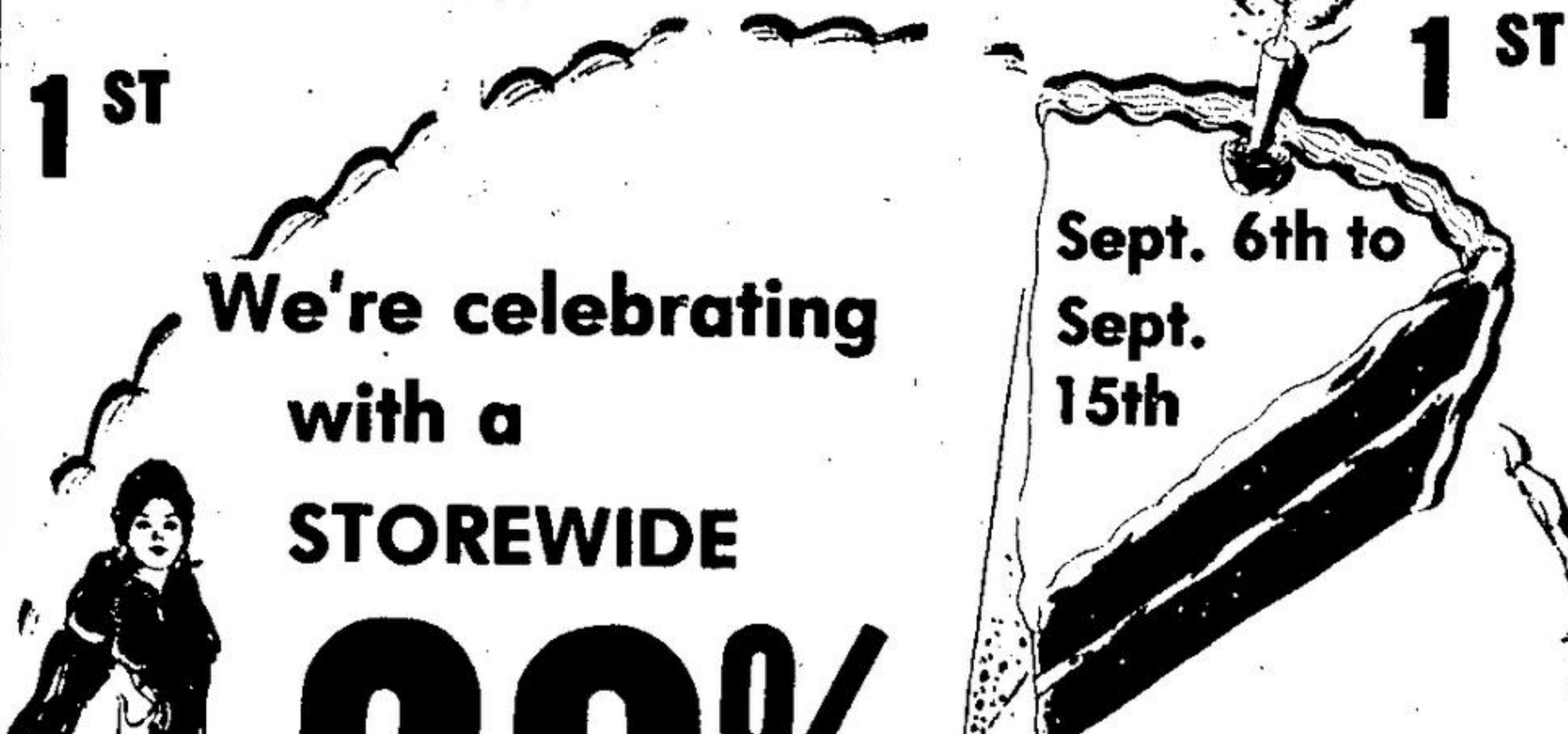
