Fire levels Powadiuk barn

A noon hour fire yesterday (Tuesday) levelled a barn belonging to Terra Bella Ltd. at Ambleswood Farms on the Guelph Line, just south of 22 Sideroad. Members of the Powadiuk family are partners in the Terra Bella firm. Approximately 50 haystacks in a nearby field were also destroyed as strong winds spread flames in a southerly direction. There was no stock in the barn, but it is known a quantity of straw and a sailing dinghy were lost in the fire. An equipment shed a few yards north of the barn was not damaged.

Barn gone
Acton Firefighters

reponded to the call, but turned their attention to controlling fire in the haystacks since the barn was almost completely destroyed by the time they arrived. Hoses were hooked up and water drawn from a pond near the barn of Joseph Powadiuk which is at the front of the property. The Terra Bella barn and a stone house occupied by sons

Russell and Robert Powadiuk is directly behind at the end of a quarter-mile long lane.

Stop fire
Firefighters remained at the scene most of the afternoon to prevent the fire from spreading to bordering dry fields. Cause of the blaze is not known.

The farm was once owned by the Youart family and more recently by Malcolm

Moffat.

The barn was the second in the Speyside area to be levelled in eight days. Last week the farm of Jim Brown on the Fourth Line of Esqueping, south of 15 Sideroad was destroyed by fire.
