## Orv Chapman enters race

Councillor Orval Chapman, a veteran of five years on Acton Council and four years on the old local school board jumped into the race for the two local Ward 1 seats on the North Halton council just before the deadline for nominations Monday.

Councillor Chapman has been chairman of council's police and fire committee for all five years and has also served four years on the Acton parks and recreation committee and one year on planning board. He was chairman of the local school board for one year.

"Acton will need strong representation on the North Halton council, but I hope it will be representation that will look at the area as a whole and not necessarily just their own backyard", Councillor Chapman said in declaring himself a candidate.

He said he would like to see the present arena renovation program continued so that ice can be installed earlier and kept later and better use made of the building.

A resident of Acton for more than 20 years, Orval resides with his wife Marie and daughter Cathy at 68 Nelson Court. He is manager of the A.P. Green Refractories plant.

## Barry Inscoe seeks seat

"I want to see Acton stay a progressive community and not be swallowed up in the region", Councillor Barry Inscoe said in declaring himself a candidate for the two North Halton area council seats in Ward 1 (Acton) this week.

A freshman member of Acton council, Mr. Inscoe has served on Acton parks and recreation committee for the past three years and has been very active in local minor sports programs.

"This is a whole new ballgame", Mr. Inscoe commented in reference to the regional takeover. "You have to have strong representation to get your points across to representatives of the other towns in the borough".

A resident of Acton for the past 18 years, Mr. Inscoe resides with his wife Joanne, son Robin and daughter Sandra at 242 Arthur St. He is a quality control inspector with the Varian firm in Georgetown.

Councillor Inscoe is one of five candidates in the race for two seats.

## Marks criticizes paving program

Paving program in Lakeview subdivision may be changed this week, as deputy reeve Peter Marks Tuesday at council questioned the spending of \$6,000 to surface treat side streets there.

The decision had been made by the public works committee on recommendation of the engineer. It was included in the current paving program underway in town. (Mr. Marks is not on this committee.)

Two weeks notice had to be given on the work with a deadline of Sept. 14. After council Mr. Marks' objections, clerk-administrator Grant Usher agreed to contact the engineer and contractors to see if their directions could be changed.

## SWEEP

Project SWEEP (Students Working in an Environmental Enhancement Program) draws to a close in the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

The SWEEP students will now all be returning to respective colleges and universities to continue their educations.

Intended was a treatment of tar and stones.

Mr. Marks felt it would be wiser to double surface treat Lakeview road (the short street entering into the subdivision from Highway 7) and west on Elmore as far as funds would allow. He had contacted some residents, he said, who objected to the tar: it tracks in, makes baby buggies stick and trips up bikes. "Even do some of it properly," he advised.

Mayor Duby pointed out some of the streets are "deplorable" and the committee had wanted to do what they could before regional government came.

Mr. Marks felt the mayor's attitude was "pessimistic" and that surely regional government would be allocating funds to Acton. "We're trying to second guess them and wasting \$6,000," he declared.

Chairman disagrees Roads chairman Earl Masales disagreed and said Elmore is in basically good shape. He also felt the work was already committed.

Councillor Inscoe said that if residents didn't want the surface treatment on the side

streets they should try to get out of the agreement and put double surface asphalt on the one road.

Manholes raised Reeve McKenzie ruefully pointed out the manholes are already raised for the job.

If we pave now we'll give the whole area a whole coating, Councillor Chapman said.

There are too many "ifs", observed Mr. Coles.

The clerk was to investigate further, on motion moved by Mr. Marks.
