Councillor Orval Chapman, a veteran of five years on Acton Council and four years on the old local school board jumped into the race for the two local Ward I seats on the North Halton council just before the deadline for nominations Monday.

Councillor Chapman has been chairman of council's police and fire committe for all five years and has also served four years on the Acton parks and recreation committee and one year on planning board. He was chairman of the local school board for one year.

"Acton will need strong representation on the North Halton council, but I hope it will be representation that will look at the area as a whole and not necessarily just their own backyard", Councillor Chapman said in declaring himself a can-

The Acri building will be used by the Commercial Shearing and Stamping with the adjoining lot for future expansion.



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
