Upaide-down apple plo & large cooking apples a tablespoons butter is cup white sugar t tablespoon flour is teaspoon cinnamon

1/3 cup brown sugar 's cup shredded Cheddar pastry for a 9-inch crust

Peel, and thinly slice apples.

Melt is cup of the butter in a frypan and lightly sauto apple. Combine white sugar, flour and cinnamon; sprinkle over apple stices and toss lightly. Cool. Preheat oven to 375°F. Spread remaining 2 tablespoons butter on bottom and sides of a 9-inch ple plate; sprinkle with brown augar. Arrange apple slices in bottom of pie plate. Combine cheese and pastry. Roll into a winch circle. Place ove. apples; tuck edges under and flute. Prick top. Bake in preheated oven 30 to 35 minutes. Cool on wire rack 10 minutes. Invert onto serving plate; Serve warm with wedges of Cheddar cheese.

SHORT CRUST PASTRY

to make two crusts 2 cups pastry flour. 1 Thep sugar is top salt '2 cup cold shortening 3 Thep hard butter

3 to 5 Thep orange juice. Sift dry ingredients. Cut in

shortening and then butter. Stir in enough juice to hold particles together. Press mixture into a ball and chill slightly before rolling (about 20 minutes.)



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
