# Park visitors 'way up CNE winners

Attendance at the Grand River Conservation Authority's nine major conservation areas went up with the temperature during the recent heat spell. Rock-wood park had 18,000 more visitors this year.

As the mercury hit the nineties every day of the last week of August and Saturday and Sunday of the Labor Day weekend, Grand River valley residents flocked to nearby conservation areas to try and beat the heat.

In a comparison with the same period last year 78,000 people visited the areas, more than doubling the 1972 attendance of 33,000 people. Among the greater in-creases are Brant Conservation Area near Brantford, with 56,000 more people

near Cambridge, with an increase of 20,000, Rockwood up 18,000, Elora Gorge with an increase of 15,000 and Laurel Creek in Waterloo, up


