Beware advice of experts

Disturbed by a report in a Toronto daily which indicated a solution to the waste disposal problem should be left to the experts and public hearings dispensed with, GUARD chairman Bill Johnson appeared at Monday night's meeting of Enfranchising Council and was assured his group will have the opportunity to appear before council if any new developments occur.

According to Johnson, Georgetown Reeve Rick Morrow was reported to have been in favor of leaving the garbage problem to the experts, a position which was supported by Burlington Deputy-reeve David Coons, he said.

He warned that if the advice of the experts were accepted, Esqueness could become the "garbage dump" of the Halton Region. Six of 10 waste disposal sites outlined in a report are in Esqueness, he said.

If possible "This eventually could cause a rift between the north and the south," Johnson warned. "Right below the report in the paper was another report about a dump polluting wells."

Johnson said that in all his travels across Canada, in the U.S. and in the British Isles he has never seen a sanitary landfill site. On land adjoining the Don Valley Parkway which was built on top of a waste disposal site there are no trees and skiing is impossible on the hills because of pipes which are draining methane gas from below the surface, according to the GUARD chairman.

He claimed the energy crisis could be relieved if garbage were processed and used for the benefit of the people. According to a scientific report 35,000 tons of garbage is equal to 100,000 tons of coal or 14 million gallons of fuel oil.

Defends Coons
Deputy-reeve Len Coxe, who also sits on county council defended Burlington deputy-reeve Coons, pointing out Coons probably meant taxpayers' money would be better spent on something to get rid of garbage than on further meetings to get the feelings of the public. He explained that McLaren and Co. wanted another \$30,000 to conduct further public meetings.

"My impression was that he was acting more in support of people participation throughout the county. I don't really think he was being detrimental," Coxe said.

Johnson claimed it would cost his group close to \$10,000 to go through the process of fighting the establishment of landfill sites in the township and said he just wanted to make council aware of what was going on.

Reeve Hill said council was grateful for the work already done by GUARD and promised they would be kept informed of proceedings and allowed to voice their opinions.

APPOINTMENT OF VOTING PROXY

Any person whose name is entered on the polling list for a polling subdivision in the municipality and who is,

- (a) A person other than one who is in a hospital or other institution, where a polling place has been provided on such premises for the purpose of polling or where provision has been made to attend upon such persons for the purpose of receiving their ballot, and
- (b) A person who is certified by a legally qualified medical practitioner, by a certificate filed with the clerk, to be physically incapable of attending a polling place;
- (c) A person absent from his regular residence by reason of attending an educational institution and expects by reason of such absence from the municipality to be unable to vote at the advance poll or on polling day; or
- (d) A person who expects to be absent from his Polling subdivision during the election period including the advance poll and polling day by reason of his being engaged for hire or reward in the business of transportation by railway, air, water or motor vehicle,

may, on forms obtainable at the Office of the Returning Officer, 251 Main Street East, Milton, appoint any person to vote in his stead who is entitled to vote in the same municipality.

Such persons must be appointed and certified by the Clerk of the Municipality during the two week period following nomination day. (Period from Sept. 11/73 to Sept. 25/73, inclusive, but not later than 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 25/73)
