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# Norval wells polluted water shortage exists

Pollution of wells in Norval has prompted a group of 78 ratepayers in the hamlet to petition Esquimes Council to have a new water supply established.

Dim Wittekoek, spokesman for the group, told council Monday night Norval is short of water, many wells are polluted and some families are having water trucked in now. He said 78 out of a possible 95 homeowners in Norval have signed the petition.

Reeve Tom Hill explained council could attack the problem in two ways by either contacting the town of Georgetown to see if they could extend a water line to Norval or by asking the

Water Resources branch of the Department of the Environment to take underground water tests in the hamlet.

Suggests haste  
"This council should go to work now so that this matter will be on the floor before regional government gets going," the reeve suggested. Replying to a question from Councillor Dick Howitt, Reeve Hill said installation of water services in Norval could be carried out as a local improvement.

Councillor George Maltby thought it much wiser for Norval to hook into the existing water system in Georgetown.  
"Water could be in there by

the end of the year, if we went to Georgetown," he pointed out. "Hydrologists' reports seem to take a lengthy time. I tried to encourage those people to come here earlier, but it wasn't to be."

Ask costs  
Councillor Howitt wondered if ratepayers were concerned about the costs involved.

Wittekoek replied that they would appreciate knowing

what the costs of both would be.

Reeve Hill said he thought costs could be debentured over a 30 year period. Councillor Maltby later said he believes the reason for pollution of the wells is merely that a high concentration of population has been living in an unserviced area for a long period of time.

"The ground just gets saturated," he said.

# Coho back to spawn


Coho Salmon are gradually wending their way back to the Credit River from the depths of Lake Ontario to spawn, writes District Biologist, Al Wainio, in this week's issue of the Ministry of Natural Resources Release.

The fish were planted in the Credit in the spring of 1972 and will head upstream during September. Mr. Wainio reports that this should be the year of the "big run".

The Ministry report emphasizes that fishing should be excellent at the mouth of the river as the spawning season gets underway.
