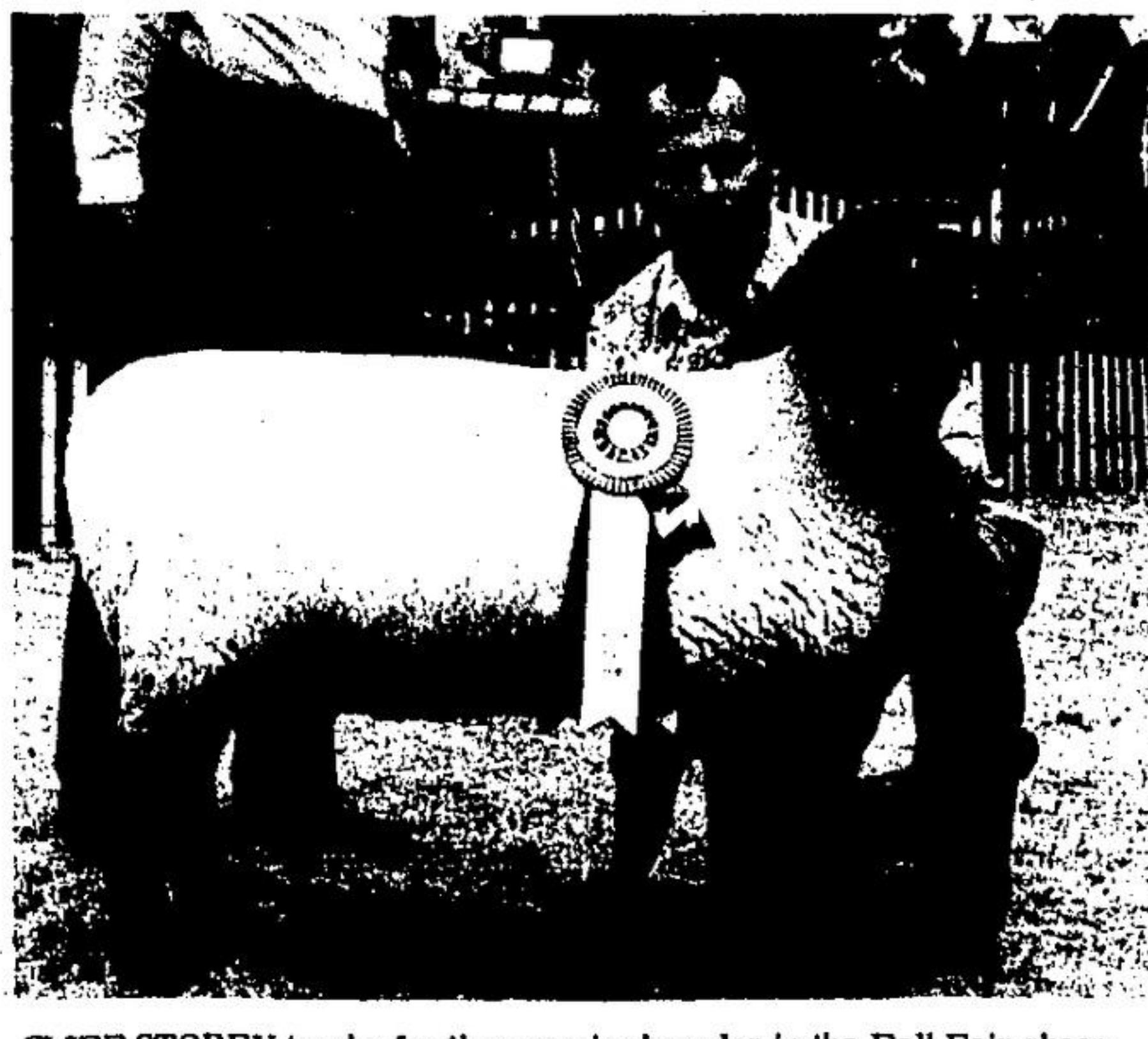

John Root honored at P.C. conference

Mr. John Root, M.P.P. for Wellington-Dufferin, and Mrs. Margaret Burt, his campaign director in six elections, were among the 300 persons who attended the Mid-Term Conference called by Premier Davis. Held at Egin House in the Muskoka area, the conference gave the Government and key persons in the Progressive Conservative Party an opportunity to look over achievements and discuss strategy and programs. Keynote speaker opening the Conference was the Honourable Robert Welch. Following the discussions, Premier Davis delivered a forthright address at the dinner on Saturday evening.

Colorful ceremonies planned for Bishop's installation

At 4 p.m. on September 30 John Bothwell, following an ages-old tradition, will march up to the doors of Christ's Church Cathedral in Hamilton, knock several times with his pastoral staff and ask to be admitted. After entering to a fanfare by the Canadian Brass, and in the course of a specially written service, the Right Reverend John C. Bothwell will be installed as the Anglican Bishop of Niagara, succeeding the Right Reverend Walter E. Bagnall who retired in June. St. Alban's, Acton and St. John's, Rockwood, are in the Diocese of Niagara.

The actual transfer will occur when Bishop Bagnall hands the official diocesan pastoral staff to the Wardens of the Cathedral who, in turn, will give it to Bishop Bothwell. Parishes throughout the Diocese of Niagara, including Acton, are planning to send delegations, many with banners; to the installation service which will be televised for a delayed presentation on Channel 11 at noon October 7. Students of Mohawk College in Hamilton will handle closed circuit television for an expected overflow congregation in Myler Hall, adjacent to the Cathedral. Following the service there will be a procession of clergy and congregation along James Street to the Hamilton armories where a reception will be held. The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry band will lead the procession and form a guard of honor at the armories. The Cathedral service will have an ecumenical touch with Rabbi Bernard Baskin of Anshe Sholom Temple, Hamilton, reading from the scriptures, partly in Hebrew, and the Reverend Kenneth Campbell of Burlington, Chairman of the Hamilton

Conference of the United Church of Canada, reading the Epistle. Bishop Bothwell, 47, a native of Toronto, was ordained in 1951 and has served in Toronto, Vancouver, Oakville, Dundas and Hamilton. He was elected Coadjutor Bishop of Niagara Diocese in April 1971 and was consecrated in June of that year. He is well known here.
