Rotarians run out of steam

Acton Rotary midgets won only one of six games they played in the OMLA midget "D" round robin championship tournament held in Otonabee near Peterborough on the weekend. Wallaceburg Red Devils wound up as tournament and provincial champions.

Rotarians doubled the score on Kapuskasing 10-5 for their only victory, while they lost 8-5 and 7-4 to Wallaceburg and 10-5 and 9-0 to Otonabee. Acton blew a two goal lead in the first game against Wallaceburg and relinquished a 4-0 lead in the loss to Kapuskasing.

"The team just seemed to fall apart. Individualism and too many penalties hurt us," coach Bruce Sears reports.

Ron Turkosz, one of the team's top scorers played only the first and sixth games, as he had to return to Acton to attend his brother's wedding.

In spite of their disappointing showing, coach Sears is proud of the effort his midgets made to reach the championship tournament. They previously eliminated Whitby and Belleville in playoff action, after dropping the first game of both series.

Harriers hold their own against province's best

North Halton Harriers made respectable showings in the Central Ontario cross-country championships at Kelso Conservation area Saturday.

Les Jones, a grade 9 student at Acton High placed 9th in a field of 61 in the bantam boys' 3000 metres. His time against some of the province's best was 12.31.

3000 metres is about 200 yards short of a mile. The course included several tough hills.

Mark Withers placed 36th, Jamie Vickery was 47th and Jack DeWilde 55th in the same race.

Heather Near ran a fine race to place 10th in a field of 32 in the midget girls' 3000 metres. Her time was 14.44.5.

Frank Houston was 11th in 24.53 and Scott Somerville 17th in 25.35 in the juvenile boys' 6000 metres. There were 42 entered in that race.

Coach Bruce Andrews was exceptionally pleased with Somerville's performance, saying it's the best race he's run.

In the junior boys' 8000 metres, Glen McKenzie finished 14th and 15th respectively.
