Marijuana seized by police

Acton detachment officers of the Ontario Provincial Police investigated 44 general occurrences and three motor vehicle collisions during the reporting week of September 17 to September 23. Major occurrences reported included two reports of theft, one report of malicious damage, one recovered stolen vehicle and one drug seizure. Other occurrences ranged from domestic disputes to false bank alarms. Officers were called upon to assist a man who had become buried in earth, after the trench he was working in caved in on him.

A local man was found to be in possession of a quantity of suspected marijuana, after he was searched under the authority of the Narcotic Control Act. A search of the man's residence revealed a further quantity of the alleged drug. Of the two reported thefts, one was cleared shortly after being reported and the second is still being investigated. Stolen property not yet recovered, consists of tape recorders, camera and audio equipment, stolen from Acton District High School. A local resident reported damage to his car (it had been parked unattended overnight. Investigation of the offence has not yet been completed.

A Kitchener youth was arrested and held for an escort from Waterloo Regional Police, after it was learned that the vehicle he was operating was stolen from Kitchener. Fall to appear. 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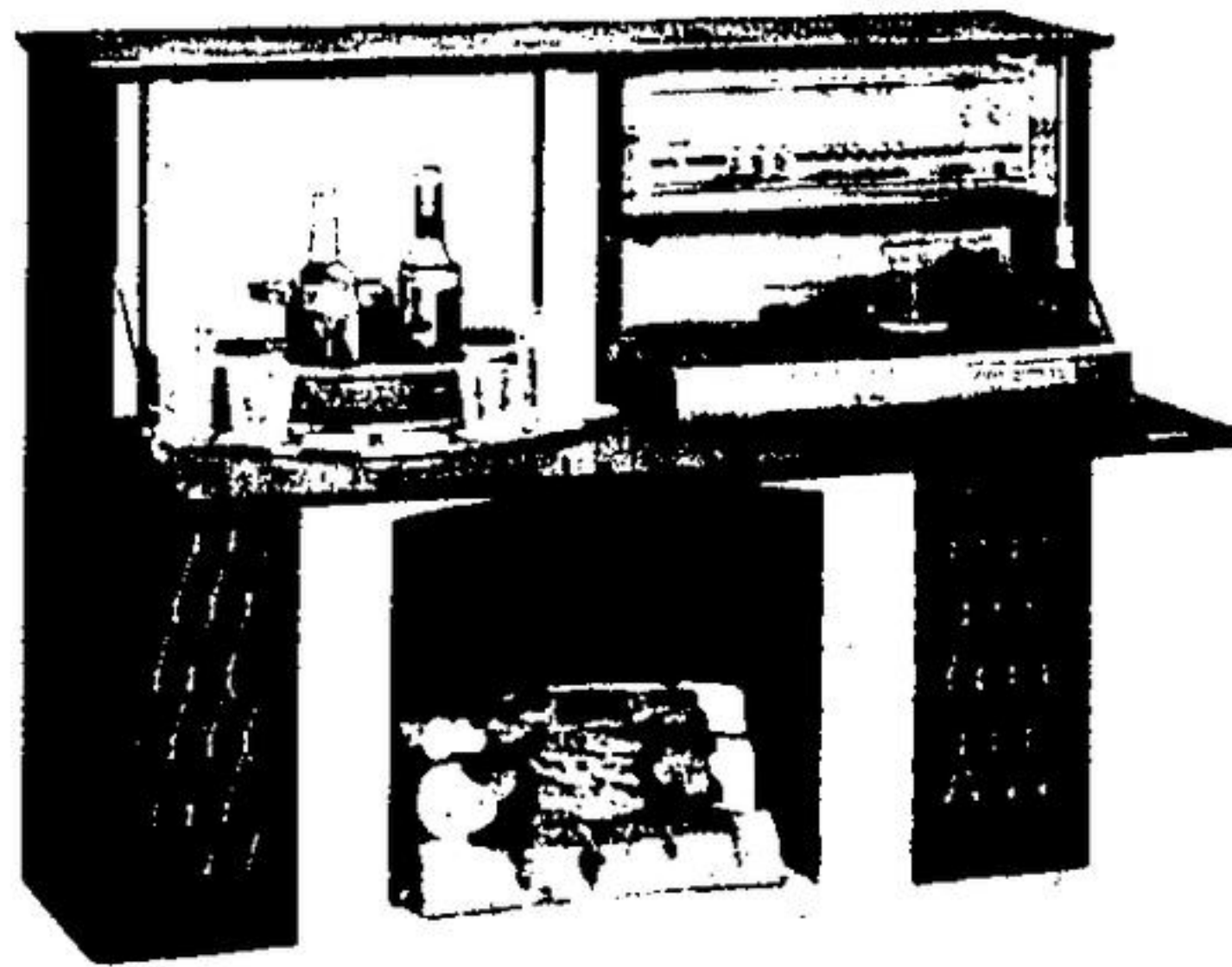
