NAMES NOT ON POLLING LIST

Any person who was qualified to have his name entered on the polling list during the period of enumeration—(June 18, 1973 to July 14, 1973) and finds that his name is not entered thereon or who has not filed the necessary forms to have his name entered during the period for corrections to such list (ending August 28/73), can attend at my office to secure a certificate which will allow his name to be entered at the polling station. In addition to this, qualified electors may be entitled to have their name added to the list at the polling station on polling day.

QUALIFIED ELECTOR MEANS: a person who during the period of June 18/73 to July 14/73 was over the age of eighteen, a Canadian citizen or other British subject, a resident of Central Halton or a non-resident owner or tenant or a spouse thereof.

PROXY VOTING

Forms are available at my office for the appointment of a voting proxy. A certificate to vote by proxy must be certified by THE CLERK. This can only be done between Sept. 11 and 5 o'clock on the afternoon of Tuesday, September 25, 1973.
