Acton High Redmen remained undefeated in cross-country meets this year when they chalked up perfect scores against Milton OSD last Wednesday and General Wolfe of Oakville Thursday.

Frank Houston, Glen McKenzie, Scott Somerville, Les Jones and Rodger McEachern took the first five places in the meet with OSD to produce the perfect score of 10. Houston's winning time for the three mile course was 16:53.

Dennis Blake, Cliff Ian Campbell and Bob Charette of AHS were also among the first 10 finishers.

Heather Near and Anne Smith placed first and second respectively in the ladies' 1 1/2 mile event with times of 13:10 and 13:44.

Janet Johnson, Anne Smith, Linda McKenzie and Mary Ellen Cann took the first four spots in the ladies' 1 1/2 mile event against General Wolfe. Janet's winning time was 11:41.

Frank Houston completed the 2 1/2 mile men's course in 12:19 to take first place. Scott Somerville was second in 13:05, Rodger McEachern third, Les Jones fourth and Dennis Blake fifth.

Beginning with 1974 models, one key will unlock only the ignition; the companion key—which previously locked only the trunk and glove compartment—will be used in '74 models to unlock the doors plus station wagon and truck tailgates. Preliminary reports show that 89,229 automobiles were stolen in Canada last year and 67.4 percent were recovered. Approximately 17 percent of all stolen vehicles are involved in accidents.

Plowmen and politicians from Halton were active at the 1973 International Plowing Match in Lambton County last week.

Halton's Wurden Mrs. Anne MacArthur entered the class for county wardens Tuesday and had to plow with a horse-drawn plow—her first time ever. She didn't win but reports it was a lot of fun. Warden G. Massie of Glenora County emerged the winner, over 24 entries.

Milton Mayor Brian Best competed in the mayors' class on Saturday and failed to bring home the trophy he captured with a first place furrow in 1971. It was his sixth year of competition.

About \$75,000 in assessment will be coming to Nassagaweya Township sooner than it might have been, if the council had not protested what they felt was the slow work of the regional assessment department.

Council had told the assessment department many properties in the township had received building permits in 1972 and 1973 and the buildings had not yet been placed on the assessment roll.

After checking the properties noted on a list from the township, regional assessment officer Robert Beach told the council some properties were not complete and couldn't yet be put on the rolls and others that were complete had been added.

Check law on streams

Owning an attractive waterfront property on a river or small stream has its obvious advantages. However, the owner could be in an embarrassing position if he fails to check the laws governing watercourses before he decides to change his specific section.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority warns owners purchasing land with a watercourse in the Credit River Watershed to check the municipal, provincial, federal laws and Authority regulations before construction begins.

Subject to laws

All streams are subject to one federal and three provincial laws and the fill, construction and alteration to waterways regulations of the Conservation Authority. These regulations insist that anyone planning to place fill, construct a building of any kind or alter any existing

watercourse must have approval of the Authority.

Floodline mapping for the Credit River and its larger tributaries is complete and maps are available at the Authority's Administration Office in Meadowdale.
