White Oaks Ceramics new Milton location

White Oaks Ceramics is now located at Milton, instead of Acton. John and Sharon Secord have moved from their home at R.R.3, north of Acton, to Milton and are now

in partnership with Susan and Bernard Henry. Their new ceramics factory is located in the Alliance Industrial Mall on Steeles Ave. in Milton. The quarters north of Acton

were growing too small.

New line
 Their products are sold across Canada in gift shops. They now have a special kitchen line which includes filled honey pots and special pottery containing maple cream and maple syrup.

White Oaks Ceramics also produces coffee and dinnerware sets, onion soup bowls, decanter sets, vases, ash trays and many decorative pieces.

Glazes and clay are custom mixed and all casting done by hand. John Secord does all the mold-making having studied the art from a fellow craftsman. "It is really a dying art," he says. "It isn't something you learn in school."

Their sales of "seconds" were especially popular with Acton friends. John and Sharon will be missed in the community and best wishes go with them for their expanding business. They have two children now, the latest a baby boy born this summer.

Escarpment office set up in Georgetown

The 17-member Commission, under the chairmanship of George R. McCague, former mayor of Alliston, will establish its offices on December 1, 1973, at 232 Guelph Street, Georgetown, to determine the use, co-ordinate purchases, and generally provide for the maintenance of the Niagara Escarpment and land in its vicinity as a continuous natural environment.

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Becker's addition, small lots nixed

Planning board Thursday looked with disfavor on three applications circulated from the Committee of Adjustment.

Becker's Milk seek permission to build a 6,000-square foot addition for storage and the planning board motion was not to support the application due to lack of parking space, until advice is received from the town planner.

Lou Bonnette estimated the addition would bring Becker's 68 parking spaces short. Becker's had pointed out in their application they have a

working agreement with the brewers' retail store for additional parking there.

Could be worse
 If we want others to comply to the bylaw we can't have this, Mr. Bonnette pointed out. And what happens in the future? He mentioned that if some other business took over the property, the lack of parking space would be more critical.

Vic Bristow, acting as chairman, said the lot is now a "ghost parking lot" but things could get worse.

Mayor Les Doby agreed much of the present space is

used for truck parking; it's used more at night than for shopping purposes.

Mr. Bonnette felt the planning board should advise the committee of adjustment they are in sympathy but in view of the fact the required parking is out by 50 per cent they feel the planners' advice should be asked.

Seven lots
 Two applications by Alfred Berry were also circulated from the committee of adjustment, and were not approved by planning board.

Mr. Berry sought to sever a part of a lot off Main St. N. to create two lots, each 55 feet wide in a 60-foot area.

The two lots are at the back of Mr. Berry's home, the former Jany farmhouse on Main N. A house is already being built. If the application were approved, the two lots would front on Nelson Court with one of them having only 12 feet street frontage despite its 55 foot width.

"This was a beautiful lot," mourned Mr. Bonnette. "I can't go along with this at all."

Others agreed.
 Shouldn't bend
 Frank Simioni said we have bylaws and they are to be changed now and then, but he favors changing them for old dwellings to make conditions better, not for new lots. "We shouldn't bend." He's creating a high density area there such as Kingham Hills.

The mayor agreed the plans did not fit in with the existing subdivision it abuts. The motion stated planning board was not in agreement with any part of the application.

Melnsac property
 Elite Lathing, a company associated with Mr. Berry, applied for minor variances to create two lots on the Melnsac property on Main N. The hearing is Wednesday, Oct. 10. The lots have less frontage than required, 47 feet rather than 50 feet.
