## **Escarpment office** set up in Georgetown

Leased premises have now been obtained in Georgetown for use by the Niagara Escarpment Commission, established under an Act passed by the Legislature last June.

The 17-member Commission, under the chairmanship of George R. McCague, for-mer mayor of Alliston, will establish its offices on December 1, 1973, at 232 Guelph Street, Georgetown, to determine the use, co-ordinate purchases, and generally provide for the maintenance of the Niagara Escarpment and land in its vicinity as a continuous natural environ-

The office premises, comprising the whole of the second floor and part of the Niaga basement, and totalling sulas.

approximately 8,600 sq. ft. of space, have been leased from Colossus Development Corporation which owns and occupies the building.
