Fluoride clinic at Centennial

The why's, what's and how's of tooth brushing with each grade learning at their own level and the Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph Health Unit spent three days last week in the Rockwood Centennial School bringing the students from kindergarten to grade 8 up to date on tooth care and dental hygiene.

"Ugh" and some of the students turned up noses saying they hated the taste of the fluoride solution which, according to dental hygienist M. Ludzik, can prevent up to 80 percent tooth decay if used regularly.

The trained dental expert cited a recent study conducted at Camp Borden as an example of group usage of oral fluoridation. She pointed out that, in a group study carried over an approximate three year period the dental staff was able to be cut back from six to one dentist for the whole station.

New brushes

The Rockwood children were delighted with their plastic encased brand new toothbrushes given out by Mrs. Flo-Ann Hattle, dental assistant, who worked closely with Mrs. Ludzik as she explained to the children the need of dental health. Mrs. Hattle used a large plastic model of teeth and showed the correct method of brushing.

The children were intrigued as she explained the importance of the ups and downs of proper cleansing habits.

The program of instruction is not new in the Wellington county area. Although Mrs. Ludzik has only been with the local clinic for the last two years, she was previously with the Halton Health Unit. She says the program in the Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph area started up four years ago and she is anxious to stress to all parents and adults the need to recognize that fluoridation does prevent decay.

According to Mrs. Ludzik the number of Rockwood Centennial students receiving the treatment varies from 10 to 90 percent depending on age levels.

Some of the older children just dislike the taste of the solution and, rather than allow themselves to be subjected to it don't take consent slips home to parents. In other cases the parents don't understand the procedure or the preventative function of the fluoride and so don't sign the slips.

During their days in Rockwood the dental team taught the kindergarten and grade one children proper brushing methods and assisted them by brushing every set of small teeth personally.
