regularly. The trained dental expert aited a recent study conducted at Camp Borden as an example of group usage of oral fluoridation. She pointed out that, in a group study carried over an approximate three year period the dental staff was able to be cut back from six to one dentist for the whole station.

According to Mrs. Ludzik the number of Rockwood Centennial students receiving the treatment varies from 10 to 90 percent depending on age levels.

Some of the older children just dislike the taste of the solution and, rather than allow themselves to be subjected to it don't take consent slips home to parents. In other cases the parents don't understand the procedure or the preventative function of the fluoride and so don't sign the slips.
