## Turn first sod for Legion Hall

First sod was turned Tuesday morning for the new \$350,000 Legion hall, to be built on 10 acres beside Fairy Lake, Legion president Bob Angell and Mayor Les Duby were present for the symbolic first turning of the land, formerly Cecil Nelles' farm.

Fred Allen and Gord James. The future Legion hall will be approached from Mill St., with a turn west of Cameron St. The building will rise at the far end of the large lot, near the lakeshore, with patio outside to take advantage of

There are five entrances to the building.


Parking Parking facilities are for 200 cars.

Their truck, owned by Susan's mother Jean McPhail, went off the fourth line of Esquesing south of 17 sideroad on a crest, rolling over on the east side of the road-
