Site of the production will be Wrigglesworth School, Guelph St., Georgetown.

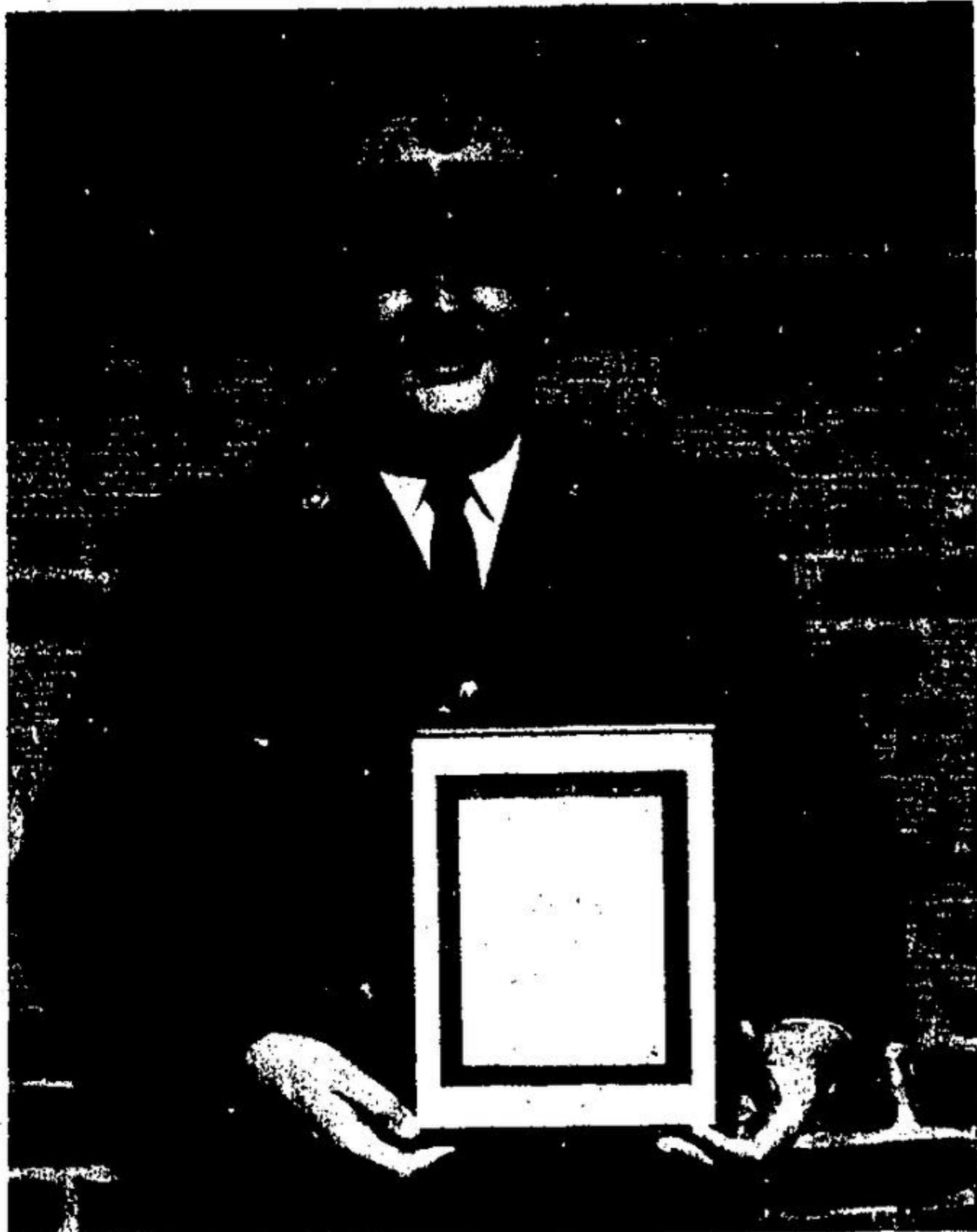

Charges laid by OPP

Acton police charged a local woman with two counts of uttering forged documents this week. She was charged after two forged cheques were issued to local stores. She was to appear in court in Guelph, where she also faces charges laid by Guelph O.P.P.

On Oct. 10 a local man was charged with selling cigarettes to minor. He appears in court Nov. 8. A car stolen from Esquesing township was recovered in Acton the next day, on Oct. 12. The investigation is continuing.

Disturbance An out-of-town man was charged with possession of marijuana after a check on Mill E. He appears in court Jan. 16. Also on Saturday, when police checked a vehicle they arrested a local man on a warrant for Hamilton police. Over the weekend there were seven liquor seizures in town, two impaired drivers and one person driving while under suspension, according to police.

A second week is planned for men November 3-10. Father Jeremiah (Jerry) Hayes, a Redemptorist priest who has preached at St. Joseph's before, is conducting the mission. Father Hayes was ordained in 1946 and in 1949 his superiors sent him to Italy to learn Italian. He made use of the language aiding Italian immigrants to Toronto for 15 years. For the past 10 years Father Hayes has preached missions in Eastern Canada and the adjoining United States. Preaching is the specific work of the Redemptorist Order which was founded by St. Alphonsus de Liguori in 1762. He used St. Paul as a model for his exhortations. Parish missions are conducted to update or renew the faith of the people of God with a thorough presentation of the Word. Father J. Gillen, parish priest at St. Joseph's, points out knowledge of the Scriptures has increased 30 times in the past 15 years and the knowledge and growth of faith must grow proportionately. Masses will be said twice daily throughout the week of mission at 9:15 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. with instruction in the morning and a sermon in the evening.
