# Parish mission at St. Joseph's

A week of "smog clearing" is the theme for a parish renewal mission being conducted at St. Joseph's Church, Church St., Acton. from Saturday night this week until the following Saturday. The first week is for women only.

A second week is planned for men November 3-10. Father Jeremiah (Jerry) Hayes, a Redemptorist priest who has preached at St. Joseph's before, is conducting the mission.

Father Hayes was ordained in 1946 and in 1949 his superiors sent him to Italy to learn Italian. He made use of the language aiding Italian immigrants to Toronto for 15 years. For the past 10 years Father Hayes has preached missions in Eastern Canada and the adjoining United

Preaching is the specific work of the Redemptorist Order which was founded by St. Alphonsus de Ligueri in 1732. He used St. Paul as a model for his exhortations.

Parish missions are conducted to update or renew the faith of the people of God with a thorough presentation of the Word. Father J. Gillen, parish priest at St. Joseph's, points out knowledge of the Scriptures has increased 30 times in the past 15 years and the knowledge and growth of faith must grow proportionately.

Masses will be said twice daily throughout the week of mission at 9.15 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. with instruction in the morning and a sermon in the evening.

A second week of mission for the men of the parish is being held from November 3 to 10 preached by Father
