

# Cycle and Sports shop includes repairs, rentals

Having looked at Acton with an eye towards setting up some sort of business the town did not already have, a former Acton man is availing himself full force these days to the newly-opened cycle shop where sales and specialist maintenance for all types of small engines are part of his trade.

The Acton Cycle and Sports first opened its doors shortly after fall fair weekend. Proprietor of the shop, Sergio Romano takes a special pride in his new endeavour and, to make sure he'd be tops in his trade, took a training course at Mohawk College in Brampton qualifying himself as a first class mechanic in small engines.

Snowmobiles, mini bikes, and garden power equipment are all on the sale list of the ambitious proprietor with service for all sales part of the deal. "We also have a rental for certain types of equipment," said Mr. Romano, but right now he feels he is just getting organized on rental requirements and has to first find out what goes and what doesn't.

Depends "Depends on what people want" and Mr. Romano believes in the policy of customer satisfaction every time. Small engine repairs trade is a new phase of Mr. Romano's career and his move to the Acton district is not the first stint for him and his family. In 1967, as a welding inspector, he and Ann, his wife, together with their young daughter, Diana, nine, lived on Cobble Hill Rd. for three years. While living there, their family increased

and a son, Wesley, now four, was born at Guelph General Hospital. Tragedy hit when Sergio was sent by his company to Nova Scotia and, while there, fell off a 50 foot steel holding inside an oil tank at a new refinery. A broken back with 12 months of hospitalization, surgery, and therapy treatments, finally established that Sergio Romano, 31, would have 70 percent loss of limb usage from waist down. After realization of his particular plight and the recognition that he could not just bemoan his problems but must work them out, he thought about where he would like to establish himself—in what venture he could apply his particular disability to something that was not already in operation.

Acton! He and his family had been happy during their earlier stay. They had liked the people, the surrounding country, and, with investigation, found there was a need for a small engine repair shop which, along with some other sale features he could handle.

Course So he took his course at Mohawk. He had always been mechanically inclined and, together with his ambition to "be his own boss" the course paid off. Mr. Romano feels that he will make a special contribution to the town of Acton with his particular know-how.

Right now sales are "good". He operates his business from 9:30 to 6 p.m. and already has mental hopes of expansion. Snowmobile sales are moving and so are
