# MPPs ask input on hydro opponents provide it

Halton MPPs George Kerr and Jim Snow called a meeting of citizens' groups and individuals who are protesting the Howlett recommendations to the Solandt Commission concerning the route of the proposed hydro corridors.

They pointed out that besides the briefs from Halton County residents, the Ontario Government would also be presenting a brief. They said they wanted to have a thorough knowledge of the wishes of the local residents to be included in this brief.

The majority of people at the MPP's meeting Wednesday were in favor of either the original route for the hydro corridor that skirted the northern part of Nassagaweya, or the 401 route, anything but through prime agricultural land or the scenic Rattlesnake Point area.

Messed up Jim Sheldon, representing Speyside raterayers, said of the 401 route, "The 401 has already messed up farm land and the beauty of the area. If you're doing 60 on the 401 you don't have time to look at the scenery anyway."

Most of the 300 people farmers, conservationists, raterayers and politicians—agreed on the need for more hydro power. They broke into applause when Jim Watson, deputy reeve of Nassagaweya said, "I don't believe the individual should subsidize the nation. Everyone in Ontario should pay if we need the power, not just those whose farms are affected."

Andy Frame of Burlington Public Utilities urged those present to make some kind of unified stand and let hydro get on with the building of these much-needed lines.

"The individual power users are doubling their demands," he said, "remember the cost for these new lines will be on your bill and my bill. No-one supported the energy tax but we pay for it one way or another. Hydro has been held up two years now and because of Solandt and Howlett, another year has gone by. Regardless of where it goes, a decision must be made soon."

Economics considered The original route is the cheapest route at \$297.8 million with the Parkway Route at \$364.0 million, or \$66.2 million more, it was reported.

Bob McCuaig, Milton reeve, furthered the economics argument by reading from the Milton brief, "Unless economics and the social effects are given first priority, we will not be able to afford to live in this Province ... in order to be realistic the total cost of the land acquisition line must be a major determining factor in the route selection."

Milton supports the original plan, opposing the 401 route. The lands immediately north of 401 on either side of Highway 25 up to Five Sideroad are proposed as an industrial park and services, water, sanitary sewer, gas and electricity have been sized and constructed to the south limits of 401, to service this area. The brief said if the lands north of 401 are sterilized by this route, it will result in a financial burden being placed on the citizens of the area.

There will be loss of future assessment and job opportunities and the possible loss of present potential, according to the Milton brief.

Questions Parkway Belt Jim Watson triggered a heated outburst concerning expropriation and proposed parkway belt land when he said, "There has been no indication of remuneration for land" and asked "are we going to be zoned greenbelt and is Ontario going to pay for this? Who owns the parkway belt?"

George Kerr answered that the parkway land will be acquired by the province or the hydro commission, in some cases by expropriation. He assured the assembly that a fair market price would be given. "At present there is a freeze on parkway belt land," he said, "it is really still owned by the people until we need it. We are trying to be just, fair and democratic."

His remarks did not satisfy the already vocal audience which shouted its dissatisfaction and disillusionment. Questioning Mr. Kerr they asked "What price will be the cost of the land before the freeze or since? What happens to remaining land when part of a property is taken?"

Mr. Watson tried to sum up the collective questions by asking "Why haven't the people been notified?" stating that a land price has never been mentioned to people in the parkway belt and they are living in fear of being bulldozed.

Kerr, Snow confronted Mr. Kerr, in an attempt to calm the apparent rising tempers, assured the value of the land.

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## Let's talk about HORSES

QUESTION: What is the best way to remove burrs from a horse's tail and mane?  
ANSWER: Whatever you do, don't resort to cutting them out — it takes far too long to grow the hair back again. Coat your hands with baby oil or mineral oil. This will help the burrs to slide easily from the hair and protect your skin from itchiness. Arm yourself with a mane comb and start pulling the hair from the burrs. Even the most impossible looking mess can be separated by pulling the hairs out until the burrs can be worked out with your fingers or the mane comb.

If there are a lot of burrs or if your horse is restless, do only a small amount at a time.

QUESTION: I have trouble adjusting the length of my stirrups when riding. Can you please tell me how to find my right length?  
ANSWER: If you ride western, stand in your stirrups. There should be a little daylight between the seat of your pants and the saddle unless you happen to be wearing baggy pants. You can also take up the stirrup while you are standing on the ground facing the saddle. Place your fingertips in the centre of the seat and tuck the stirrup in your armpit with the leather running along your arm. In a western saddle the top of the stirrup should reach your armpit and the stirrup should hang perpendicular to the ground. In an English saddle the bottom of the stirrup will reach your armpit.

You can also check from an English saddle by taking your feet out of the stirrups and letting them hang — the stirrups will reach to your ankle bone if they are adjusted correctly.

Generally speaking, a shorter stirrup length will produce a more secure seat. Jumping requires a shorter stirrup and dressage riders use a longer one. Reining horse riders usually use a longer stirrup than cutting or games horse enthusiasts.

QUESTION: When should a colt be gelded?  
ANSWER: Between the ages of 18 months and two years is usually the best time to geld a colt. If you wait longer, you may run into discipline problems. The colt of the year — October or May — are ideal times. Wait until his second spring if you don't have mares around.
