She told of the experiences of 21 years of her and her husband in Japan where they brought up their three children, teaching them herself until the end of grade VII, then to an English school there until the end of grade XII, and to Canada for finishing. Being quite musical she organized choirs of mothers to competition level. Rev. Len Keighley worked interdenominationally in a densely populated, heavily industrialized area to bridge the gap between faith and labor in cooperation with 22 pastors of various denominations. She said there are 100 Protestant denominations in Japan and they work closely with the Roman Catholics. The people are very intelligent and are leaders in modern manufactured appliances, machinery, equipment, etc. She displayed a large assortment of gift items including clothing, dolls, fans, very fine children's books, etc.

A good number of colored slides with comments gave an even better impression of the beauty of Japan. She told us that our efforts here keep the missionaries working there. The speaker was introduced by Mrs. Sanford and thanked by Mrs. Benton.

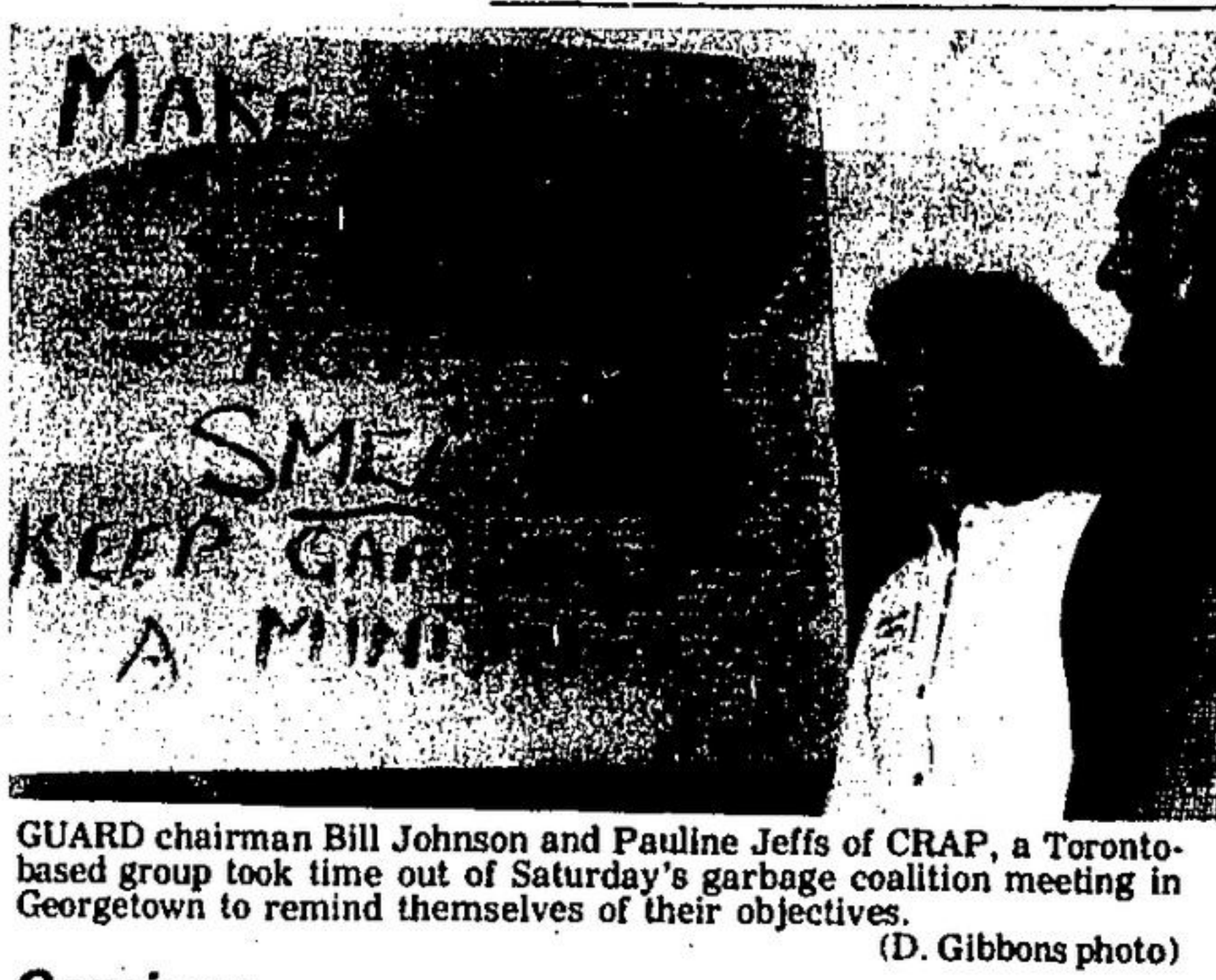
