Dave Hird (19) has joined Barrie (Jr. "B") and according to Hornet officials, prospects from the excellent Base Borden minor hockey system have been gobbled up by higher category teams. Still, the Hornet nest is not empty. Returning defencemen Phil Stubbs and Mark DePlanche are bound to sting attackers and Eric St. Peters (11), Doug Pursianen (12), Rob Owens and Larry Halbert are accomplsihed players. 


