



Modern ceremony for Ware - Gates vows

The altar of St. Alban's Anglican Church, Acton, was decorated with pink carnations and yellow mums for the marriage of Barbara Jean Gates and James Robert Ware. Rev. Laurence A. Duby, cousin of the groom, of St. Catharines, assisted by Rev. Harry Dawson officiated at the modern English ceremony Saturday, October 13, at 4 p.m.

Mrs. Frank Oakes played the organ. Leslie A. Duby sang A Wedding Prayer previous to the ceremony and O Perfect Love from the Anglican prayer book during the signing of the register. The bride is the third eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Gates. The groom is the youngest son of Mr. Harry Ware and the late Barbara Ware.

Wears locket
The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a white polyester satin gown with crocheted white lace bodice, sleeves and long train. Her finger tip veil of tulle was held by a cap of matching lace. She wore her mother's oval-shaped silver locket and her maternal grandmother's wedding band. She carried a cascade bouquet of pink roses and white stephanotis.

Miss Marian Gates was maid of honor for her sister, wearing a full length gown of palest green nylon sheer with white floral flocking over mint green.

Bridesmaids were Mrs. Barbara Funk, sister of the groom, and Miss Lydia Gates, sister of the bride. Their gowns were like the maid of honor's but over

lemon yellow. All wore white picture hats banded with white lace and pastel accents. They carried white prayer books, gifts of the bride, on which corsages of yellow and pink carnations were placed respectively.

Flower girl
Miss Wendy Funk, niece of the groom, was flower girl, gowned in yellow nylon sheer with pastel flocking over lemon yellow. She wore her long blonde curls up, intertwined with the lace ribbon, also a wedding-bell charm, gift of the bride. She carried a basket of pink roses, yellow and white chrysanthemums.

David McNeilly, Georgetown, friend of the groom, was best man. Ushers were Kenneth Gates, brother of the bride, and Allan Snow, Collingwood, cousin of the bride. The groom and his attendants wore tuxedos of black worsted wool and black velvet, white shirts with black velvet bow ties and white carnation boutonieres. Reception
The reception dinner followed in Erin Legion Hall. The bride's mother received in pink floral sheer over mauve with black accessories, deep mauve velvet bows in her hair and a white gardenia corsage. She was assisted by the groom's aunt, Mrs. Alice Duby, wearing lime green knit, gold accessories and yellow sweetheart roses, also by Mrs. Eke Ware in a grey floral suit and white carnations.

Same ornament
The wedding fruit cake was fashioned in three round layers with a candle-lit stairway strewn with pink and yellow tiny flowers, topped by an heirloom bride and groom under a Candlewick Crystal glass. This same ornament was used on the bride's parents' wedding cake. The cake was made and decorated by the bride's mother.

Honored guests present were the bride's maternal grandmother Mrs. Phidela Drouillard, Georgetown; Mrs. Beatrice Anderson, Acton, the groom's godmother; Mr. and Mrs. Donald Gates, Hamilton, the bride's godparents; Grant Baker, Georgetown, master of ceremonies for the reception; Mrs. Nancy Gates who covered the wedding by camera.

A wedding dance followed the reception with music by Skipp Maffey, Toronto. For travelling the bride changed to a black pant suit with floral gray jacket made by Mrs. Heather Wood, with a red blouse and red sweetheart roses corsage. Her bouquet was placed on the groom's mother's grave.

Her white sheer veil had pale green Queen Anne's lace printed on it and was held by a sunflower in her hair. She wore pale green shoes and an old moonstone necklace of her grandmother's. Her

bouquet was of sunflowers and cedar.
