Gzowski stamp is now collector's item

Rockwood villagers was Mrs. Vincent Price. received recently pertaining to one of Rockwood's most illustrious former associates. Dated 1813 to 1963 the

stamp boasts a picture of a steam engine on its front with Stanislaus Gzowski

According to Harry Norton, 33 Armstrong Avenue, Guelph, a hobbyist stamp collector, the stamp is identified in the Scott's catalogue, volume one, 1974, as commemorating the 150th anniversary of the birthdate of Sir Casimir and was issued ln 1963.

Scott's catalogue is, nccording to Mr. Norton. considered in collector circles, the Bible of stamp collecting.

Was engineer From the pages of Rockwood's past, Major General Sir Casimir Gzowski, as he was later known, was a prominent engineer. Polish by birth he had gone to the United States in the early nineteenth century to later come to Canada where he was appointed engineer in chief by the Grand Trunk Railway at a time when the Canadian government took over the responsibility for building the extension of the Grand Trunk from Toronto to Sarnia, now the Canadian National

Railway in Rockwood. While in Rockwood Major Gzowski became a close friend of Henry Strange, one of the village's earliest industrialists. In 1848 he designed and built the barn on the Strange property, farmlands on Rockwood's Main

A stamp of interest to Street, now owned by Mr. and

The barn stands today as a glorious edifice to a man who held several important public offices in the province for which services he was knighted. He was reportedly the name Sir Casimir also responsible for starting the Ontario Jockey club and the Toronto Stock Exchange and was a founder of Wycliffe college in Toronto. He was one of the originators of the Niagara development, now known as Niagara Park.

Cats disease carriers cleanlinessimportant

Alarm was triggered to cat lovers Sunday night when Dr. I. Tizard of the University of Guelph was televised on a Kitchener news station in which he declared that cats were the common carriers of a disease called toxo plosmosts which, when relayed to infants, could cause deformities and possible blindness.

Dr. Tizard allayed the fears of his viewers however, in an . interview later where he said that, in actuality at least 50 percent of the adult population of Canada have the disease without being aware of its presence and that 99 percent of the time it is harmlessly dormant.

According to Dr. Tizard the disease is one contacted not only by cats but also by human consumption of raw or improperly cooked meats. About cats as carriers he stressed the importance of basic hygienic good health habits for people who had them in their homes as pels. Discovered

Kitty litter, sand boxes, and handling barnyard cats which have consumed mice were the main source of the veterinarian's concern and he placed great importance on the necessity of urging small children to wash hands immediately if involved in the housekeeping of their pets. present time, tests are being conducted to ascertain other causes of the disease. Although it has been shown that all small animals seem to have it and can contaminate other animals, only the cat seems to be the one to pass it on to humans. Humans themselves do not pass it on to each other.


