# Cheap food for too long Whalen tells Liberals

Canadians should quit spend four hours a day on quibbling about the price of school buses. beef and food, Federal Minister of Agriculture Eugene Whalen told Halton Liberals at a fund-raising dinner in the Pine Room of Oakville Arena Friday.

Whalen said Canadiana have had cheap food too long and should be prepared to pay for good food. He said the country must attempt to preserve family farms but If society insists on treating farmers and farm families as peasantry, family farms will soon be a thing of the past. New trend

The minister offered some encouragement about the trend swinging back in favor of family farms. He said his department was in the process of bringing legis-lation before the House of Commons that would provide better financing from the federal government.

During the past four months about 40 per cent of those farmers making application for farm loans were 26 years old or younger. Whalen stressed the need to stop the flood of young people from the farms to the cities \*and good paying factory jobs.

He continually referred to the farmer as the forgotten man. "There is no other place in society where the mother, the children and the father work and only one gets paid. There's nothing on the ledger for the children and the

Whalen said that with the coming of district schools and closing of small rural schools, have come problems for the farmer, Many farm children

Society should pay Questioned following his speech. Whalen said that often the four hours would

have been put to good use in doing chores on the farm. But society should be prepared now the farmer has to hire to pay for it - not the farsomeone to fill the role played mer. earlier by his children in after

"Farm children have abandoned the countryside and the family farms of Canada by the tens of thousands over the past two generations. They have taken Jobs in the cities, but if you ask them how they like living in the city, most will tell you they hate it. They would love to move back to the country and to the farm. But Canadians have concentrated their dollars and their thinking on cities and industry, and have forgotten

the farmers," he said. Whalen said the farmer is the "forgotten person" when it comes to growth and development in our municipalities. "Urban planners grab off the best form land and turn it into industrial parks, shopping centres and subdivisions. Cities hand out incentives by the bushel to attract industries and stores, but give nothing to farmers. Speculators drive out into the countryside buying up farm land to hold for future profits. And the profits must come from some use other than

Higher prices "The farmers who want to remain in business, or expand, are forced to pay the higher price for land, a price that makes farming a nonprofit operation. lation to keep farm land in agriculture, he noted. British Columbia passed the strongest legislation we have ever seen in North America to preserve farm land. One unfortunate side effect in that the legislation has, at the same time, sharply reduced the value of the pension many farmers were counting on. in Newfoundland, they are going to pass a law to lock the entire Avalon Peninsula in "Here in Ontario, the

government is moving to keep green belts and the Ningara fruit belt out of urban development, and in agriculture. These moves are not being made for the farmer. They are being made for the rest of society. Too often gotten, even though it is his farm, his pension, and his future that is most affected by the new policies and law, Whalen concluded.
