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Parks Board and Recreation briefs

At Monday's meeting of Parks and Recreation Committee several items of business were dealt with, including:

—The decision to have estimates from a Kitchener firm on the cost of insulating the roof of the arena as an assurance of ice earlier in the season. Board members had requested Dalton Engineering give a suggested figure as they had been responsible for renovations on the building. However, with the information that such an estimate would cost a fee of \$2,500 the committee felt it would be more feasible to contact another firm.

It was resolved:

—That water seeping in on the floor at the south wall of arena should be investigated immediately and the 15 per cent hold back for work completed by Dalton Engineering held in abeyance until properly repaired. The secretary was requested to contact the engineering firm of Morrison and Hershfield requesting that the matter be rectified;

—That the placement of

outdoor rinks on the M.Z. Bennett and Robert Little School areas would be held off pending receipt of an answer to an earlier one sent to the Halton County School Board requesting permission for the use of school facilities for dressing and changing skates.

—Bert Hinton, representing the Acton Fair Board, approached the board requesting consideration for hydro and water at the end of the Acton park to facilitate better cleaning conditions for Fair cattle. Mr. Hinton explained that the quality of animals being brought to the fair are high grade and, if water is available the Fair Board will be able to add prize herds next year. Mr. Hinton specified that he would, of course, hope the water installed will be at a location suitable for the most number of people.

The chairman requested Mr. Hinton to get a copy of a map of Prospect Park and plan with the Agricultural society indicating the preferred placement of the hydro facilities which would best meet their needs and bring it back to the board for approval.

It was further resolved:

—That a hot dog warmer be purchased at a cost of \$450 for the arena booth. Harold Townsley told the board that,

with crowds attending the Junior games, hot dog sales have been tremendous with complete sell-outs in the first period. The new warmer will accommodate the required hot dog sales for the second period;

—That costs should be investigated on malicious damage insurance. With several instances of vandalism in the arena during the past few months, including paint spreading and damaged entrance doors, the board felt it was feasible to consider insurance. Decision to purchase was left pending, depending on findings;

—That a letter be sent to Nassagaweya thanking them for their contribution of \$200 towards the Parks and Recreation Board;

—That Christmas turkeys or \$15 will be given to all arena staff with \$7.50 the gift for part-time assistants;

—That the Board agree to hire the three Acton boys who applied for the position of rink rats for the arena; Jeff Townsley, Jimmie Hurley, and Eddie Ensing;

—That the date of the Parks and Recreation Committee's final '73 meeting pre-empt the annual Christmas get-together and the date set for the meeting is that of December 13.
