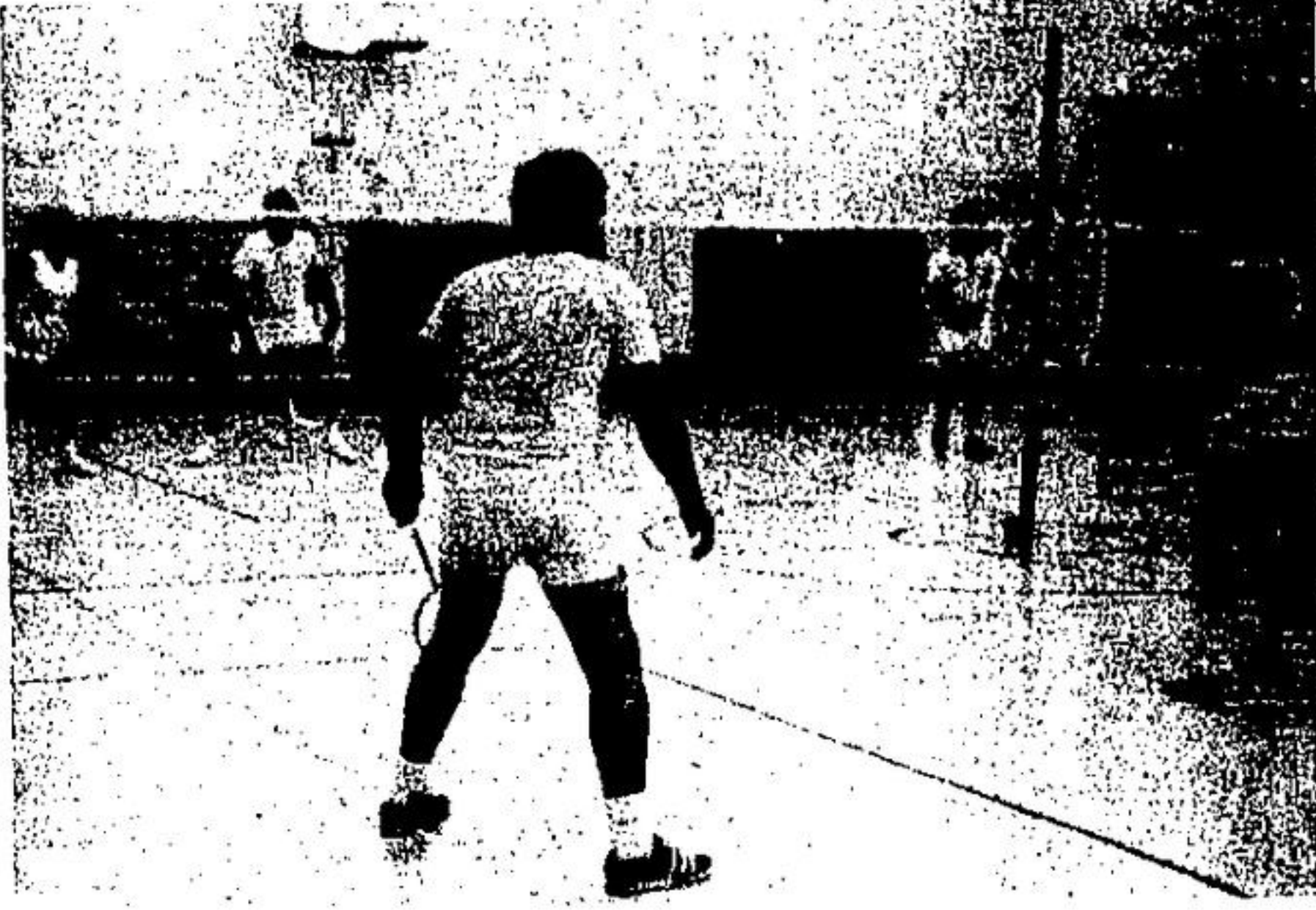

## Try to organize sports council

An attempt to organize a community sports council in the Acton area was left in mid-air this week when Ed Wood, a member of the Acton Parks and Recreation Board, attempted to communicate with all potential sports organizers with little success.

"I advertised in the paper," he said, "and certainly tried to vocally invite all those I could to attend a meeting, but either they weren't interested or didn't see the ad."

Mr. Wood is anxious to establish contact with people interested in all areas of recreation so that a sports council can be organized as soon as possible.

A letter from the Sports and Recreation Branch of the Ministry of Community and Social Services informed Mr. Wood that there are five community sports councils in existence with nine more in the deliberation stage, indicating many communities are now investigating their importance.

A common communication line between people affecting sports in the community is the basic reason for the council, according to Bob Farrow, regional sports consultant, but Ed Wood has in mind a means to promote clinics in various sports, develop all round better athletes, help to recruit volunteers i.e. coaches, managers, trainers, etc., help identify long range planning needs for community sport and, along with other considerations, help create a strong voice with provincial sport-governing bodies who have funds for training clinics.

He lists his phone number as 853-0195 and requests that all people interested in the survival or promotion of local sports contact him.
