Driver education rates going up \$10

Driver education courses made available to secondary school students in Halton County by the board of education will cost \$10 more next year than they did this year. During the school year 1972-73, 803 students graduated from the course. The course cost \$43.395 to run while fees from students accounted for \$36.135. The board agreed at a meeting Thursday to increase the fee of \$45 per person to \$55, to cover the increased costs in the program. Last year the board subsidized the program to the extent of \$7,260. This year it will subsidize the program to a lesser degree. Last year students from each of the five towns in the county attended. Acton had 50 students attend, Georgetown 82, Milton 49, Oakville 35 and Burlington 287.
