### Operating Safety of Power Tools

Power tools are made to save time. Make work easier. And even add a touch of extra fun to do-it-yourselfing. But it must always be remembered that power tools can be dangerous if not handled properly.

Learn what your power tool will do and what it will not do. The proper tool for the job makes the job easier. The improper tool makes that job dangerous.

Everyone who operates a power tool should do so with all his senses about him. Never operate a power tool in a lackadaisical manner. Know what you are doing and keep your mind on it.

### Clip and Save

Power tools are not toys! They should be kept out of the hands of young children.

- If you are about to use a power saw for example, remember:
- 1) Before you start, check the material you are going to cut for things like nails, bolts or even knots
  - 2) When actually cutting, use a slow, even motion to prevent binding the blade
  - 3) After you have finished with the power saw - DISCONNECT the power plug

Follow these simple safety rules and your power saw will perform the way you want - and you'll help to prevent accidents, too.
