Following court ruling

Pete Marzo eligible for NCAA hockey

BOSTON—Pete Marzo, who played for Guelph's Centennial Cup championship team in 1972 was one of two Boston University players, cleared by a United States district court judge, to play for the university team.

Marzo, a native of Acton, and Bill Buckton of Southampton, filed a suit against the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference and Boston University trustees after being barred from college hockey, for accepting expense money while playing junior

hockey in Ontario. The two players admitted they accepted expense money, room and board, but contended they did not accept money to play hockey.

Judge Joseph Tauro restrained the NCAA and ECAC from declaring Marzo and Buckton ineligible and from imposing sanctions against Boston University. An appeal is expected, but the judge ruled the two players eligible immediately.

Athletic director Warren Schmalzer of BU said Marzo and Buckton would continue to play with the Terriers. Marzo accepted an Athletic Scholarship at Boston University, after completing his junior hockey career with Guelph CMCA.

NOTICE

PLEASE TAKE NOTE the Acton Planning Board proposes to amend the Official Plan of the Acton Planning Area as provided for by Section 12 and Section 17 of the Planning Act, R. S. O. 1970.

The Proposed Amendment is Cited Below: Amendment No. 7 to the Official Plan of the Acton Planning Area for the property formerly known as The Melisaac Garage

1. Purpose and Basis of the Amendment

This Amendment is the result of an application made by the owner of the lands affected by the Amendment whereby the owner has requested permission to change the use from those permitted in a Commercial-Automotive C2 Zone as provided for under Restricted Area By-law No. 1359 as amended to one or more of those uses permitted in a Commercial-General C1 Zone. In view of the fact that the intended change of land use is toward a permitted use more compatible with the surrounding uses, it is considered desirable to amend the land use designation in the Official Plan of the lands which are the subject of this Amendment. Section III of this Amendment sets out in detail the item which is to be amended in the Official Plan.

2. Existing Conditions

The site of the proposed change is presently occupied by a frame garage attached to which at the rear is a metal clad shed. It is proposed that these buildings be demolished and in their place be built a new modern office building for one or more of the uses permitted in a Commercial General C1 Zone.

3. Map Change Description and Location

The change of land use designation from Commercial Automotive C2 Zone to Commercial General C1 Zone for a parcel of land on the east side of Main Street more particularly described as Lot No. 233 according to a compiled plan for the Town of Acton registered as No. 1098 all of which is indicated on the map annexed hereto as Schedule "A" entitled:

"Official Plan of Acton Planning Area Amendment No. 7"

4. Development Policy

The policy for Commercial General development under Subsection 2 of Section B of Section IV. B.2 on Page 11 of the Official Plan shall apply.

5. Implementation

The detailed zoning classifications will be based on a development plan covering the whole area included in this amendment. The appropriate zoning classifications will be established as an amendment to By-law 1358. Any persons interested may within the prescribed time, file in writing their opposition to or support the said amendment, to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Acton Planning Board, 48 Mill Street East, Acton. Final date for filing objections will be December 12th, 1973.
