

### ACTON Municipal Council ACTIVITIES

Acton council dealt with a variety of matters at their regular meeting Tuesday, Nov. 27.

A grant of \$250 was made to the Milton County Farmstead and Rural Home competition. Council learned that Acton was the only municipality which had not yet donated. Georgetown had given \$500, Esqueping \$300, Milton \$300, Massagway \$100, Oakville \$300, Burlington \$300.

Councillors Masales and Coats opposed the motion. The match will be held in Esqueping next year. Population-wise, the south isn't contributing much, said Mr. Masales.

Commerce Cres. and Wallace St. are to be designated as public highways, in connection with development in the industrial park. Hufnagel St. will disappear. Apparently no by-law had ever been registered designating the streets.

Five model homes for Acton Meadows were approved.

A by-law approved rezoning for Acton Medical Centre. Entrance will be from Frederick St. and exit on Bower Ave., with 27 parking spaces.

At the committee meeting, ways of stopping delinquent drivers at Peel and Acton Blvd. were discussed. If signs, police patrols and lines are not effective the matter will be discussed again.

Council was to obtain costs of more lights for the school lane and arena entrance from hydro.

Council had no objection to R. V. Anderson Associates acting as engineers for Gino Civiero and Paul Nielsen for engineering in the industrial park, despite the fact they are the town engineers as well. Halton Hills will have its own engineering staff come January.

Type of building to house the new well at the tip of the park was discussed again. The engineer recommended a log-cabin panabode type of building. He felt the type of land would not permit an underground building. Deputy-reeve Marks pointed out septic tanks are built underground all right without water seepage. Mr. Coats favored it above ground. Put birdbuses on it, he suggested.

## \$50,000 scalehouse for Dufferin

J. E. McCombe, manager of quarry operations for Dufferin Aggregates, appeared Monday night at Esqueping council meeting for a building permit for a scalehouse to be built at the new quarry at Milton.

The permit was approved by council. Mr. McCombe showed plans of the quarry. The scalehouse is to be a two-storey building with washrooms, the second storey predominantly galss windows for a dispatcher to direct traffic. It will be constructed by Campbell Construction, Milton. Estimated cost is \$50,000.

More permits Several others also appeared at the meeting applying for building permits. York Auto Wreckers is to receive a permit to build a steel prefab storage building, 16 by 80 feet, on their property

on the fourth line, lot 21. Ellis Taylor wants to construct a building behind his present garage on the Sixth Line, lot 29, Con. 7, where he will pursue his hobbies of woodworking and gunsmithing. He's been doing this kind of work for 25 years. The building permit will be approved with the understanding the building may not be used as a barn if the property is sold.

There was also considerable discussion when Ian Johnson asked for a building permit for a residence on 10 acres he owns on Highway 25.

The \$1,000 grant received from the Community Centres Act. Councillor Coats commented there is a difference of opinion whether the money belongs to the town or to the board.

An agreement will be prepared providing for the sale of land behind houses in Lakeview belonging to the Bray, Turner, Schroeder and Vadeika families. The town will keep land seven feet by 240 feet along the shore of the lake.

Appointments to the centennial program committee were deferred by the administration committee to their next program meeting.

The engineers will prepare the necessary documents to call tenders for highway 7 and 25 intersections improvement

Representatives from the Committee of Adjustment will be asked to attend a committee meeting to explain their stand. Houses Georgetown dentists Harry Greig and Jack Kirby explained their plans for residences for their families on lot 29, Con. 10, a property with a "beautiful view" but very bad road. They intend to improve the unopened road allowance of the 10th line. An extension of a residential building permit (11) next September was granted to Don Norton.

Referred back to committee was Eric Leslie's application for a building permit for lot 25, con. 11. This irregularly shaped lot he owns has 49 foot frontage but a long lane to the main part of the property, behind another lot.
