Driving on the Guelph Line in Nassagaweya, just below Brookville you'll come to a beautiful old stone house on a

hill. You have probably stopped to admire it and perhaps to take a picture.

Velma and Clifford Nicholson are used to people admiring their home. It sits well back from the road on seven beautifully landscaped acres.
A 12 foot deep pond mirrors the house and trees.

In September 1962 the Nicholsons finally found their wanted property with a stream and Clifford was looking for a stone house to fix to his liking. Clifford got his wish but had to dig the pond to satisfy Velma!
