Fire prevention posters

Bureau honors poster artists

Six winners of Halton Fire Prevention Bureau's 1973 fire prevention poster competition were honored at an awards night in Milton last week.

Desk pen sets and certificates of achievement were presented to Patty-Jo Cutrara of Georgetown and Richard Norris of Speyside-top boy and girl in the Bureau's 16th annual county-wide contest for grade five students. Their schools were presented with the Halwell Insurance trophies. Patty-Jo lives at 26 McGillivray Cres., Georgetown and is a student at Holy Cross Separate School, Georgetown. Richard lives on Seventh Line, R.R. 2 Georgetown, and attends Speyside Public School.

Honorable mention winners were Monica Schafhauser and Dino Dal Bello of Holy Rosary Separate School of Milton, Danielle Guio of St. Vincent's Separate School in Oakville and Yves Rouselle of Sacre Coeur Separate School, Georgetown. Each received a certificate of achievement and a silver dollar.

Parents, teachers and principals attended. The presentations were held at a dinner in their honor in Milton Fire Hall, attended by about 75 well-wishers. Firefighters from the five Halton fire departments, contest judges from Chinguacousy Fire Department, municipal councillors, parents and the top two winners' teachers and principals attended.

Halton Warden Mrs. Anne MacArthur presented the pen set and certificate to Richard Norris. Guest speaker Ron Weir, Chinguacousy's chief fire prevention officer, presented Patty-Jo's prizes. Donald Matheson and John Coburn of Halwell Insurance

presented the school trophies to principal Perrott of Holy Cross and Speyside principal Ron Howell.

Both winning entries will be entered in an all-Ontario poster contest sponsored by the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs.

"Start early. The children who entered this contest will be a lot more conscious of the dangers of fire in the future," speaker Ron Weir told the audience. He explained it was difficult to teach fire prevention to adults so firefighters do as much work as they can with children—to impress them of the need for fire prevention at an early age in the hope the knowledge will stay with them to adulthood.

Taking advantage of a captive audience of municipal government officials, he suggested politicians too often "legislate by catastrophe." "I don't know what price you can put on a life, but it doesn't cost much to implement strong by-laws covering fire safety in your community," he said. "You are dealing with people's lives, it's not just a case of dollars," he added.

Seen enough Weir said it was unfortunate that it often takes a tragedy to make people more aware of the need for fire safety. "I have seen enough heartbreak to last a lifetime," he said. "I would like all those who are careless with fire to look at the charred body of a child."

Milton Firefighter Jim Coulson, 1973 chairman of Halton Fire Prevention Bureau, chaired the dinner. Other speakers included Chief J. D. Wilson of Oakville, Halton Mutual Aid co-ordin-

Brookville Estate proposal

Brookville Estates this week presented Nassagaweya Council with new plans for the housing development on the Guelph Line in the area of the Township Hall.

The size of lots has been increased, reducing the number of lots over 100 to 63. A company spokesman said the lots would all be about one acre. He said the homes would be built with the high middle income people in mind. The homes would sell for about \$75,000 he estimated.

The plans call for an 11 acre park and in all the project encompasses 92.5 acres. The project has been the subject of an OMB hearing.

The hearing was adjourned several months ago and the board recommended a project with lower density. The provincial government had earlier suggested the project was premature and shouldn't be considered until government policy was clearly outlined for the area.

Milton Police Chief Ray Address has been named Staff Inspector for the northern district in Halton Region. That announcement was one of several made by the new Halton Police Commission last week.

Floyd Schwantz, present chief of police in Georgetown has been named staff inspector at the administration branch.

Address will assume responsibility for the 23-man Georgetown Police Force and eventually his department will expand as the regional force replaces the present OPP detachment in Acton.
