

Acton fire chief Mick Holmes has been slated as fire chief for the new town of Halton Hills over three other applicants.

The selection was made at a closed meeting of Halton Hills council last Wednesday evening and no official announcement has yet been made, but the appointments were "leaked" to press and public. The position is a full time one.

Mick Holmes has been with the Acton Fire Department as chief for the last 12 years. He served as deputy chief prior to his appointment as chief when Chief Jack Newton left the community. He has been the manager of the Acton yard of J. B. Mackenzle.
