

Sabres get stung in Hornet nest Sunday

Acton Sabres slipped to third place in the Central Ontario Junior "C" standings, a point back of Stayner when they were whipped 7-2 by the Alliston Hornets in Alliston Sunday afternoon.

Sabres edged the rapidly-improving Hornets 2-1 in a goaltenders duel between Ric Tomkinson and Jamie Doane here Friday night.

Alliston grabbed a 3-0 first period lead and increased it to 5-2 after two periods Sunday. Bill McGiloway, who has been playing exceptionally well since he moved from centre to a wing position bagged both Acton goals in the second period. Charlie McRae assisted on one marker.

Peter O'Leary and Doug Anderson netted two goals

apiece for the Hornets. Single tallies went to Tom Anderson, Phil Stubbs and Rick Hopper. Bert Osborne of the Sabres faces his second suspension of the season, after he picked up a major misconduct in the third period. Shots on goal in the game were surprisingly only 34-33 in favor of Alliston.

Lee Young and Doug Patten bulged the twine and Hillsburgh recruit Gary Saul assisted twice for the Sabres in Friday night's game.

Only five points separate the league's top four teams now, as Sabres prepare to take on the Penetang Hurons here Friday night at 9 and travel to Bradford to face the first place Vaseys Sunday night at 8:15.
